FIGHTING IN EARNEST.

Thirteen Americans Killed and Fifty Wounded, Several Fatally.

CAVALRY ATTACKED A SUPERIOR FORCE

WAR NEWS PARAPHRASED.

Tampa is again to be made a military camp of reinforcements for the Army of Invasion, and a fleet of transports will be concentrated in Tampa Bay.

The Holland-American liner Obdam is to be chartered by the United States as a transport.

General Shafter's forces have been landed at Balquid, twelve miles east of Morro Castle. The debarkation was effected by a fire from the guns of Spanish batteries. The landing was accomplished without serious casualties. The trouble, the killing of a man aboard the Texas being the only fatality. The Spanish forces are being concentrated at Santiago de Cuba, and a battle is expected to occur there within a few days.

ANTICIPATE EASY VICTORY

Spanish Forces Giving Way So Readily Encourages a Belief in Their Weakness.

CRUEL ONLY TO BE KIND.

Americans Will Carry the War Into Spain to Cure Their Stubbornness.

Washington, D.C., June 24.—The war is carried into Africa, metaphorically speaking, if Spain is foolishly enough to send the Cadiz fleet through the Suez Canal to attack Dewey in the Philippines. It is announced on good authority that the last Spanish vessel has passed through the canal in American waters. THE ASSASSIN MADE GOOD HIS ESCAPE

Two Tramps Were Ordered Away by a C. P. R. Watchman and They Gave Him a Beating—Policeman Twomey Went to the Rescue and Was Shot Through the Head—Both Tramps Escaped—One of the Fugitives Has Lost a Leg.

London, Ont., June 24.—(Special to The World).—Policeman Michael Twomey was murdered while in the execution of his duty shortly after 9 o'clock to-night, and the perpetrator of the awful deed is still at liberty. The murder was committed at the corner of Ontario and Eglar-avenue, East London, where C. P. R. Watchman Murray had trouble with two tramps whom he had ejected from a car. The tramps, one of whom had only one leg, set upon Murray and were beating him, when Policeman Twomey was called. He attempted to place the tramps under arrest, and while he was attending to one of them the other fired two shots at him from a revolver.
