The resolution was voted down by the government and its supporters by its full majority, and there is no doubt that a similar timely resolution this session would meet with a similar fate.

## West Spes No Benefit From Money Spent in the East.

Ottawa, April 16 .- A caucus of Liberal members was held to-day in room 16, W. C. Edwards presiding. It resolved itself into a regular "kickers' meeting, members bringing forward their grievances in batches.

Mr. Oliver, for instance, complaine that the returning officers in his riding had not yet been paid, while the mem-bers representing constituencies along the Intercolonial Railway complained of the service and the manner in which the patronage was monopolized by a few friends of Mr. Blair.

But perhaps the most significant protest raised was by Mr. McCreary of Selkirk, who complained that enor-mous sums were being spent on the St. Lawrence channel for which the West got no benefit whatever. Because of the caucus, all the House committees were called off this morn-
