Castro Resigns Office Amid Great Excitement

Congress Urges President to Reconsider His Decision and Votes Confidence.

Caracas, March 22.-The Congression al Hall was crowded yesterday afternoon, and all the members of the diplomatic corps were present, when | President Castro read his message to Congress. He passed in review the terrible conditions which prevailed in the country and denounced the errors of his countrymen, "but," he continued, "if it is painful to consider how much blood and how many tears have been shed, yet it is a consolation to think that their bitter stream by the law of compensation will fecundate something that should correspond to present day aspirations, since every struggle begets aspirations, since every struggle begets one idea and every victorious idea justifies the supposition that an onward step has been taken in the road to human perfection. Our victory, citizen legislators, over the great adversities which have just oppressed us must terminate the tumults of our life, otherwise we shall reach a shameful dissolution."




