decided so establish similar relations in the empire to those that existed between the different states of the union. A proposition of this kind demanded time, thought and statesmanship. Patriotism in Canada meast neither Grit nor Tory in any question affecting the life of the empire. If they joined the United States they would assist in paying taxes for the policing of the seas, but in Canada, they had never paid a cent for the protection or conservation of the empire. "THE PENURIOUSNESS ON THE PART OF CANADA IN THE PAST FILLS ME WITH SHAME." said the speaker, and the sentiment was evidently shared by all of his hearers. He believed with Mr. Borden that they should not pay any fixed sum annually, but they must face the question. CANADA MUST EITHER JOIN THE EMPIRE OR DECLARE HER INDEPENDENCE SOON. The government and the opposition were watching each other in an endeavor to gain a party advantage, but they should try to convince them that the question was above partyism.

Other scheme Favored,
R. C. Strele followed and spoke on how the scheme would affect Canada. Free trade within the empire would be impossible, as Canada could not there by raise a revenue. He suggested that the government should be asked to put a duty of 40 per cent on the imports of foreign countries, and 20 per cent, for he colonies, a proposition that met with much favor. Mr. Steele said that when the matter of Canada giving no support to the maintenance of the empire was mentioned, it touched him on the raw, for they had done nothing. He then advocated the construction by Canada of a fast line of steamers that could be converted into cruisers.

E. B. Osfer, M.P., admitted the justice of the charge against the political parties. Both sides in the House, however, were almost entirely in favor of Mr. Chamberlain's scheme, but it had been deemed not advisable to present a resolution in the House unless it was assured of the unanimous approval of the members on both sides. Personally, he believed Mr. Chamberlain had struck the note required to give the needed impetus to the unification of the empire.

Col. Denison was the last speaker, and strongly favored the policy of Mr. Chamberlain, in which Canada had been the pioneer. It was necessary that they should send out an absolutely clear note, for the people were taking advantage of every little quibble and endeavoring to create the impression that the manufacturers of Canada were opposed to the policy of fiscal reform. Send Clear Note,
