Talbot street school is closed today in token of the death of the late Miss Dunbar.

Mr. Sam. Cooper, of California, formerly of London, is spending a few days with Mr. J. A. Tucker, 24 Burwell street.

The London Insane Asylum was opened 25 years ago last week-day. Since that time 4,001 patients have been received.

Sir Kts. R. Ironside, G.V.C., and F.J. Fitzgerald, S. P., of this city, attended a meeting of the executive committee of the Grand Lodge, K. of F., at Hamilton yesterday.

The report that Dr. P. B. Wood intended removing to Hamilton is not so. He has returned from William street to the corner of Dundas and Burwell streets.

Last night after 11 o'clock Miss L. Lodge, K. of F., No. 32, conferred the third degree for the benefit of Guy Bros., the minstrels, who are Knights of high degree.

Miss Lee, the teacher who substituted for the late Miss Dunbar, of the latter's illness, will continue in charge of the class until the end of the year, when a permanent appointment will be made.

A Boston paper, referring to gifts to its public library, says: "They also accepted from Dr. Bucke, of London, Ont., through Herbert Smith, of this city, fifteen volumes including manuscripts and photographs relating to Walt Whitman."

On Monday night last the exempting team of Miss Lodge, No. 22, Knights of Pythias, paid a visit to Prospect Lodge, No. 16, and conferred the third degree. About seventy brethren were present.

Mr. Richard Vick, of this city, has been informed that the body of his son George, who was killed near Cincinnati, Ohio, by falling off a freight train, was given to the medical authorities of a college at Cleveland. Mr. Vick will make an effort to secure the body, if it is not yet dissected.

A short meeting of the water commissioners was held yesterday. It was decided to print and distribute copies of the new bylaws. The chief change since the original draft is the charge of \$4 for motors in private dwellings for pumping purposes, when water is pumped into storage tanks.

In the past week 16,432,912 gallons of water were pumped at the water-works. The reservoir is full.

By the last will and testament of Rev. David Campbell, of Forest, is bequeathed the sum of \$50. The trustees of the Protestant Orphans' Home are informed that someone asked for a grant for training the Boys' Brigade, and also is collecting from the public. They wish it distinctly understood that no one is authorized by them to collect for this purpose.

Mr. John Baker, an engineer, residing at 37 Adelaide street, narrowly escaped serious injury at the corner of Dundas and Wellington streets about 8:30 o'clock last night. He was on a west-bound street car, and endeavored to alight at the crossing while the car was going at the rate of seven miles an hour. He was thrown about twenty feet on the hard pavement, and received some bruises on his head and shoulders. He has been on the sick list for a few days, and was on his way to Dr. Belton's when he met with the accident.

A meeting of the vestry of St. John's Church, St. Thomas, was held Monday night. The purpose of the meeting was to meet Canon Smith, of this city, who came to inquire into the advisability of separating the congregation of St. John's and that of Port Stanley, which at present form one parish, so that two parishes may be formed. The subject was thoroughly discussed, the opinion being that such a separation was advisable. Canon Smith was accompanied by the bishop and the executive committee.

Mr. Benjamin Toll, of Charters Towers, Queensland, who has been visiting his brother, Peter Toll, of this city, in the course of an eight months' tour, leaves today on his return to Australia. In Toronto he visited the Department of Mines, under charge of Mr. Blue, and was favored with a special inspection of the great drawback of Australia, he says, is heat and drought. A city waterworks push cart frightened a team of horses belonging to Mr. S. Williams, 611 Talbot street, yesterday afternoon. The team dashed away, and collided with a buggy occupied by Mr. and Mrs. McRoberts, of con. 13, London township. The latter were thrown out, and Mr. McRoberts suffered a black eye and several face bruises. Their buggy lost a wheel, and Mr. Williams' double rig was also damaged. Mr. Williams says he warned the waterworks employee not to shove his cart in front of his horses, but the man paid no attention to him. One of Mr. Williams' horses required several stitches to sew up a wound.
