Still Another Evidence of Canada's Prosperity Last Year Shown in the Bank Statement.

Among the records of evidence of Canada's prosperity in 1898 the statement of the total bank clearings in the different cities show up prominently. The clearings in all Canada for the year reached the enormous total of \$1 .-174,710,345 in 1897, an increase of \$215,-000,000, by far the largest clearings in

the history of the country.

The city of Montreal carries off the palm. The year's clearings in that city amounted to \$731,264,677, against \$601, 185,000 a year ago, or a gain of considerably over \$100,000,000. Toronto is next with \$439,489,336, against \$361,756,953 last year, and Winnipeg third, with \$90,-754,276, against \$84,435,832. All the cities of the country but Halifax and St. John show gains, and the decreases in the case of the cities mentioned are very

The Dreyfus Case Enters on Its Bitterest Chapters.

Important Conference Between Filipino and American Commissioners.

London, Jan. 11.-The Paris correspondent of the Times says: The Paris papers assert that the long visits of the Marquis de Noailles, French ambassador at Berlin, to Emperor William on Sunday, had to do with a new grouping of the powers directed against English imperialism and in favor of peace, the ambassador urging that Great Britain's publication of a series of blue books regarding future negotiations amounts to an ultimatum in disguise after arousing the opinion of the country and rendering

concessions impossible. The German papers deny that the and the French ambassador on Sunday had to do with another grouping of the powers against England. They say the kaiser has no intention of meddling in matters that do not con-

cern Germany. The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says: Emperor William the French ambassador talked of an alliance between Germany, France and Russia in the far east. France favored it and Germany encouraged the dream without intending anything

The conference between Emperor William and Noailles, the French ambassador at the German court, is the chief topic at the Euro-pean chancellories, and there are all sorts of rumors, for the most part purely guesswork. The conference, however, seems to be a token of growing friendship between Germany and France, arising from mutual interests.

FRENCH PREPARATIONS. Trustworthy advices from Paris show that France is still going forward with war preparations at Toulon, Cherbourg, Brest, and the same accumulation of supplies and munitions of war, and the same heed to every detail in equipment of the Mediterranean and channel squadrons for any exigency that there was two On both sides of the channel there has been equal effort, and in both naval services there has been a similar sense of threatening exigencies. The premier and ministers of war, marine and foreign affairs have been busy with plans for the better defense of the French possessions abroad, in which for once appreciation of pressing needs has allayed personal,

fessional and departmental jealousies. DEMANDS IN CHINA. The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: Considerable anxiety is felt regarding the French demands for territorial advantages as compensation for the July riots. The Chinese suspect that the French contemplate some decisive action. The French cruiser Descartes has been coaling and is probably now at Nankin, on the Yang Tse Kiang. Li Kung Yi, the viceroy of Nankin, is said to have resigned as a protest against the French demands by the Chinese Government.

DREYFUS' REPLY. In a telegram from Cayenne, embodying the reply of Dreyfus to questions put to him, Dreyfus energetically denies that he ever confessed that he was guilty to Capt. Lebrun Renault, and he protests his innocence.

BITTER CHAPTERS.

The Dreyfus affair has now reached one of its bitterest chapters. Accusations, vituperations and threats are raging in the courts and among the scores of boulevard sheets. It is regarded by impartial observers as the most dangerous factor to the institutions of the republic the affair has yet developed that the president of one of the chambers of the court of cassation should assume the role of a leader of agitation against the tribunal, declaring that sixteen of his colleagues are conspiring to defeat the ends of justice.

M. de Beaurepaire contributes to the papers another rhetorical denunciation of the court of cassation. He exhorts the government to take the Dreyfus case from the hands of the criminal chamber and to intrust it to the 49 magistrates composing the whole court, or to five of the oldest justices. He appeals to the Dreyfusards: "Repudiate M. Loew. Accept instead magistrates without preconceived opinions, men who are honest and slaves of the
