Want Komoka Scheme Submitted; Water Coms. Think Council Too Slow

Vote Should Be Taken So as to Allow of Work Being Proceeded With.

The water commissioners met yesterday afternoon, and transacted considerable business.

The commissioners again went on record that the council hurry the Komoka scheme, and submit it to the ratepayers at the earliest possible moment.

If it is defeated another scheme will be submitted at the municipal elections in January. The report of Engineer Bell, of St. Thomas, regarding the flow of water at Komoka, was submitted and filed for reference. In this report a spring not included in the Komoka scheme was measured, and another spring was omitted that should be put in. The figures of Mr. J. A. Stiles for this spring were added to Mr. Bell's report, but that did not materially affect the measurements.

The Komoka Figures.

Adding to Engineer Bell's report the flow of 211,680 gallons from the last spring, not measured by him, the total will be 2,345,680 gallons.

Too Much Procrastination.

The action of the council in putting off the discussion of the Komoka scheme was brought to the attention of the commissioners, and the commissioners moved that the council be asked to take immediate action on the request of the commissioners with regard to the scheme, and submit it to the ratepayers at the earliest possible moment.

Commissioner Saunders pointed out, that if the matter were unnecessarily delayed, the work could not be gone on with in time to increase the water supply next year, which was of paramount importance. He thought the council was not making the haste it should with this matter. There would have to be a great deal of pipe and other material ordered, and that would take some time. Immediate steps must be taken to prevent a shortage next year.

The Mayor's Opinion.

Mayor Judd did not think that the council was unnecessarily delaying the matter. The commission had spent many weeks, talking the matter over, and it was now desired that the council hurry through in a week on a question that had taken the commission such a time to come to a conclusion. He was not in favor of immediately submitting the bylaw to the ratepayers at a special vote, on account of the amount of expense involved.

Chairman Darch was in favor of immediate action on the matter, as nothing

could be accomplished by delay. If the Komoka scheme were submitted right away, the question of increased water supply would be solved much easier. If it were defeated another scheme could be submitted at the January elections, and then work could be commenced this coming winter. The request that the council take immediate action was passed.

Switch in Bad Shape.

Manager King of the street railway drew the attention of the commission to the condition of the switch connecting the street railway with the Grand Trunk. It is in very bad shape at present, and it will be impossible to take cars from the Grand Trunk if it is not fixed soon. Chairman Darch will look the matter up.

The commission decided to pay half the cost of the culvert at the west Cove bridge as requested by the council.

Tenders Opened.

Tenders for brick in the new boilers at Springbank were opened as follows: Sing & Beer, \$450; Mr. H. Hammett, \$475; Aid. Josh Garratt, \$405; Mr. H. Hayman, \$483. The contract was awarded to Mr. Boss.

The tenders for the dredging of the river below the to En were also opened. Mr. L. A. Boss agreed to do the work specified for \$2,000, and Mr. G. Oliver asked \$2,100. The contract was awarded to Mr. Boss.

Mr. Victor Mitchell, of Engineer Graydon's office, put in a claim for salary in connection with work done for the commission on the Saunby suit. He had taken levels and had also done some other extra work, covering a period of over a year.

Mayor Judd declared that as Mr. Mitchell at the time was an employee of the city, the money should not be paid. The communication was filed.

On the recommendation of Engineer Moore, Mr. John Bowman was refunded \$150 for overcharges.

Boilers Inspected.

Mr. Geo. C. Robb, boiler inspector, reported that he had inspected one of the new boilers ordered by the commission, and found it according to plans, and perfectly satisfactory.

Mr. A. M. Wilkins, another inspector, reported that he had inspected the other boiler and had found it satisfactory.

The county council, through Miss Mary Grant, the clerk, put in a bill for \$1 for gravel taken from the Byron hill. The matter was left with Chairman Darch for adjustment.

W. R. Trudell applied for water connection on Chandler avenue, West London. Referred to Engineer Moore.

Mr. A. Benbow applied for water connection on Methuen avenue. Referred to the engineer.

Mr. Jas. A. Stevenson and others applied for a main on Windsor avenue. Referred to Engineer Moore.

Engineer Moore and the superintendent were given power to lay any main up to four inches if there is assured enough revenue to equal ten per cent of the cost.

Water for Fountains.

The Humane Society requested that free water be granted for the fountain to be erected by the society on the market square. This request was granted.

The members present were Chairman Darch, Commissioner Saunders, Mayor Judd, Engineer Moore and Secretary O. Ellwood.

MRS. LEITER VERY ILL

Widow of Chicago Millionaire Is In Grave Danger.

Paris, Sept. 25.—Mrs. Levi Z. Leiter widow of the man who, born of poor parents in Maryland, died worth \$25,000,000, is confined to her apartments in the Hotel Ritz here, suffering from liver trouble.

Although friends of the woman, whose daughter ruled the court of India like a queen, with the title of Lady Curzon, try to minimize reports of the aged patient's condition, she is known to be in grave danger. In fact, she herself expressed fear of the outcome of her malady, but, at the same time, she sees no reason for giving up hope.

As an indication, however, of the patient's serious condition, a cable dispatch has been sent to Joseph Leiter, her son, who is in Chicago, and he will start at once for Paris. Mrs. Colin Campbell, who was Miss Nancy Leiter, is on the way from Scotland, and Lady Suffolk, who was Miss Daisy Leiter, is expected to arrive at any hour.

Mrs. Leiter's physicians have ordered her to take a complete rest. The only persons outside of the doctors who are permitted to see the woman are her maids. Mrs. Leiter has been spending most of her time making lace ornaments for her friends.

Mrs. Leiter's acquaintance in Paris is extensive. She has many warm friends here, who all day called at the hotel to inquire about her condition.

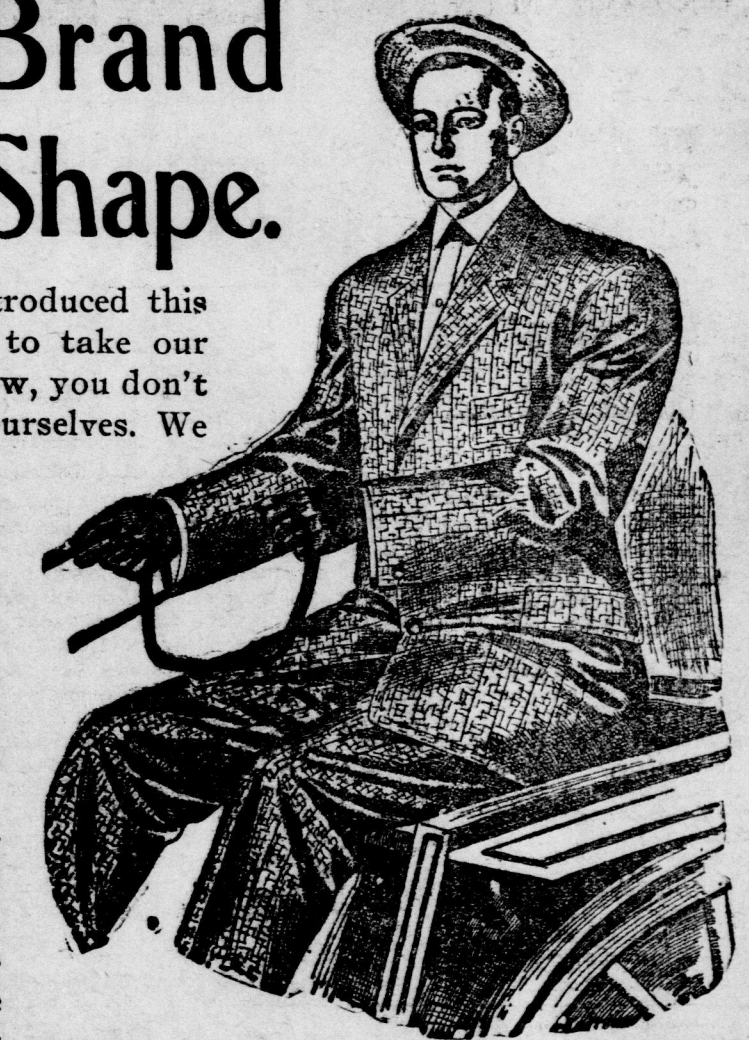

By the terms of the will which Levi Z. Leiter made eight days before his death in June, 1904, his widow received one-third of his estate. The remainder was distributed practically equally among Joseph, the one-time wheat king, and the daughters. But the funds were placed in trust, and it is provided that for a whole generation they should remain so, no conveyance of the entire estate to be made until the death of the last surviving member of the testator's family. None of the heirs is drawing more than the income from his or her allotted share.
