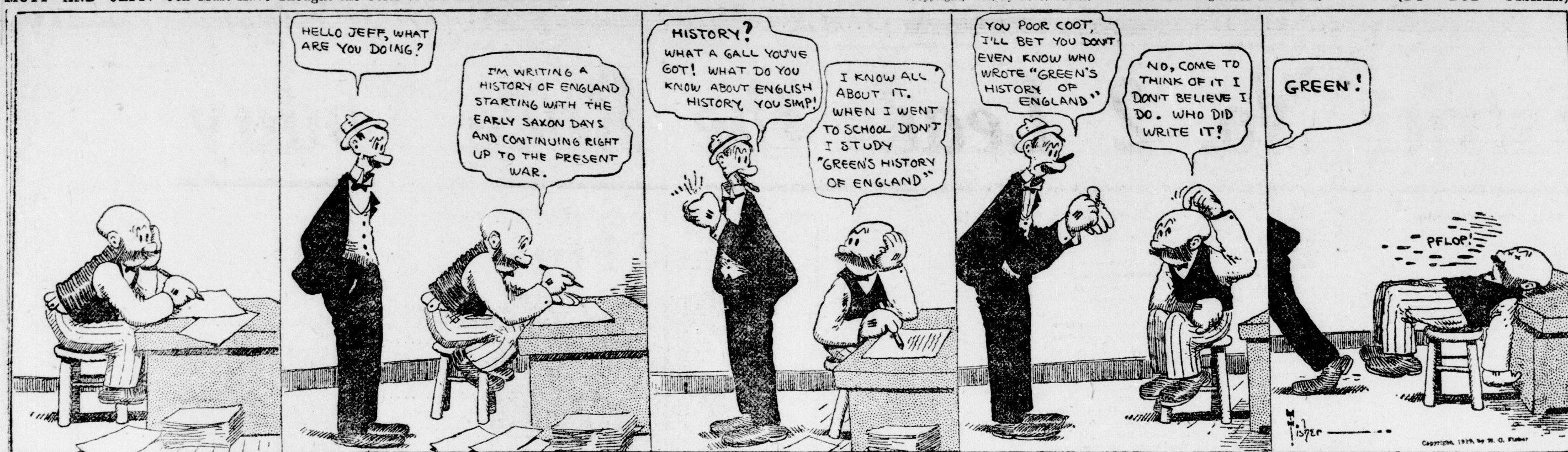

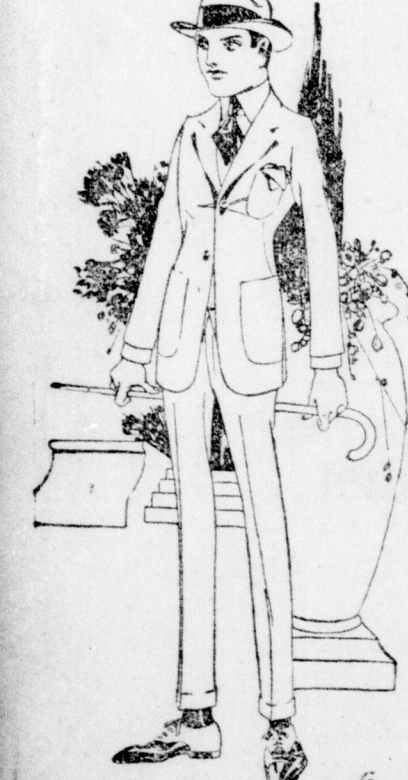

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, Ont., July 10.—Today's play in the Ontario Bowling Association annual tournament was interrupted by rain immediately after the commencement of the association competition. WESTERN GOLF GAMES ARE GOING FULL BLAST

Sixteen Survivors Are Left as Result of Day's Play.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Three leading eastern golfers, two international players and one southerner were among the sixteen survivors today of the first match round in the western golf championship, which is being played at the Midlothian Country Club. All the southern contenders except Reuben Bush of New Orleans were eliminated, including Bobby Jones of Atlanta, southern champion, who succumbed to Ned Fawcett of Chicago, 2 and 1.

Donald Edwards of Midlothian, after scoring low medal score of 159 for the 36-hole qualification, defeated Tom Prescott of Atlanta 3 and 1.

While J. S. Worthington of England defeated Perry Adams, the southerner, by the same margin.

Francis Quimet, national amateur and open champion, found a taster in A. S. McIntyre, a rather inexperienced Argentinian, but finally succeeded in winning 3 and one to play.

John G. Anderson, twice runner-up in the championship, who finally overcame his opponent on the seventeenth hole.

For the first time in a national tournament, styles were abolished under a new rule of the Western Golf Association. Some of the players like the plan, while others said it removed some of the glamour of the game.
