Industrial Court

New York, June 11.-"Establish an industrial court with full power to settle all questions between employer and employe," said Isaac A. Hopper, president of the Building Trades Employers' Association, "in the same manner and with the same authority that the civil court disposes of cases of creditor versus debtor, and the criminal court disposes of cases of the people versus the man charged with a crime, and in this way differences can be and will be quickly and finally disposed of, and the tendency to socialism and anarchism will be curtailed. Arbitration has proved a failure, because there is nothing binding on one side, nor nobody to be held responsible. I am fully convinced that this problem must be handled and solved, so that decisions will be binding on both sides and a failure to abide by decision will be followed by punishment
