Practically No Bark Gathered This Year in Oregon and Washington.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 13. - In the Mr. Davidson had judged the man, not States of Oregon and Washington, which supply the world with cascara sagrada, practically no bark was gathered this year. The season for peeling has just come to a close, and the returns received show that about two carloads was peeled in Oregon and only about four carloads in Washington during the summer months. A few years ago, when the excitement in the cascara bark market was at its height, the daily receipts at Portland often exceeded that amount. A C. P. R. Limited Express Crashes Into Harvesters' Excursion Train and Telescopes Sleeper.

#### KILLED HAMBURG SEVERAL
