

GOOD MARKET FOR BUTTER AND EGGS

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Grain—A dealer reported that he had purchased 500 bushels of barley this week at \$1.20 per bushel, or 62 1/2 cents per bushel. No oats offered, nor in fact any kind of grain.

Hay and Straw—One load of hay was brought in, which sold at \$17 a ton. A load of straw sold at \$3.50 a ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was in good demand, especially for gilt-edge, which sold at 30c for pound rolls in basket lots and 28c to 29c for crocks. Inferior grades sold at 25c to 27c per pound. Eggs were higher in price than on Thursday's market.

Vegetables and Roots—Very few potatoes were offered, and there was a good demand at 90c and 95c per bag. Rhubarb sold at \$1 per dozen. Lettuce was in large supply at 25c to 40c per dozen. Green onions, 35c to 40c per dozen. Radishes, 35c to 40c per dozen. Onions, 90c per bushel. Turnips, 40c per bag. Carrots, 40c per bushel. Parsnips, 40c per bushel. Salsify, 40c per bushel. Sage and Savory, 25c per dozen. Red cabbage, \$1 per dozen. Green cabbage, 40c to 50c per dozen.

Poultry—Turkeys sold at 12c to 15c per pound for dressed birds. Chickens, 10c to 11c dressed or 10c per pound alive. Old fowl 8c to 9c alive and about the same price dressed.

Dressed Hogs—Not over a dozen offered, which sold at \$7 per cwt.

Live Hogs—The price for Monday's shipment, as stated by Mr. McIntyre, will be \$5.10 per cwt.

There were no small pigs offered today.

Butchers' Meat—Beef sold fairly well at \$7 to \$8.50 per cwt. Veal, \$7.50 to \$9 per cwt. Lamb, 11c per pound by the carcass. Mutton, \$8 to \$9 per cwt.

Hides—The market is firm and prices were advanced a third of a cent per pound at 5c for No. 1, 4c for No. 2 and 3c for No. 3 grades.

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Barley—No. 2, 70c to 75c, according to quality.

Corn—No. 3 yellow American, 62c to 65c; Toronto freight; old corn about 72c, none offering; inferior, 60c to 65c.

Peas—No. 2, 84c to 85c.

Buckwheat—No. 2, 65c to 66c.

Oats—No. 2 white, 52c to 53c outside, 50c to 51c on track at Toronto; No. 2 mixed, 48c to 49c outside.

Flour—Manitoba patents, special brand, 65c; seconds, 64c; strong bakers, 63c; winter wheat patents are very dull, around \$2.50.

Brand—Full corn, when they can be obtained, are not sold at less than \$4 per bushel; when part of a car, the price ranges from \$2.50 up.
