# Our Consumers' League

The United States Government food experts have discovered a way of doing petter for Britain and her allies than by cutting down the consumption of wheat one-sixth per individual. These experts are prepared to tell how to give onequarter of every loaf of bread baked in the United States and Canada to those in Europe who are looking to wheat grown this side of the water to keep them from going hungry.

The method these experts suggest is simply to substitute one-fourth of some other kind of flour for wheat flour in every baking of bread. Among the substitutes for wheat flour contained in the list published are commeal, bran, oatmeal, buckwheat, rye, white bean, soy-bean, boiled potato and brown rice. The following are some cornmeal substitutes that have been suggested for

"Fried cornmeal mush, fried hominy or cornmeal pancakes, made with very little wheat flour, will be found a pleasing variation from

"Cornmeal codfish cakes, cornmeal scrapple, cornmeal croquettes, cornmeal or hominy cooked with meat, fish, cheese, eggs or milk, will

supply nourishing dishes for the hearty courses. "Hominy grits and coarse hominy (sometimes called samp), may be boiled and used like macaroni or other wheat pastes to serve as side

"For dessert, Indian pudding, cornmeal and fig or apple pudding, apple dumplings, cornmeal doughnuts, gingerbread, cake, fruit gems, etc., will contribute variety as well as nourishment to the bill of fare. "The housewife who wishes to substitute corn for some but not all of the wheat flour, can make excellent raised or light bread, pancakes, waffles, muffins, graham flour, Indian bread, etc."

#### "DON'T RISK THE BABY'S LIFE," WARNS WELFARE NURSE.

"As soon as the baby shows symptoms of fever in the hot weather, call the floctor, or at least get medical advice. Don't risk the child's life," is the warning which Miss Rankin, welfare nurse at McClary's, sounds to mothers who are readers of this department. "The trouble may be slight, and again it may be serious," she continues, adding, "MORE BABIES DIE AND SUFFER THROUGH IGNORANCE, NO MATTER HOW WELL MEANING, THAN FROM ANY OTHER CAUSE. Especially is this true of bottle-fed babies. Feeding ranks first in importance. Since there are no milk depots in London, where certified or modified milk can be obtained which will exactly meet the baby's need, those who have charge of the little ones should be most particular about thorough sterilization of milk and containers.

"Apart from summer complaint, convulsions are a grave source of trouble for the teething baby in the warm weather. A doctor should be called at once. This is the one safe rule. But in the country, for example or wherever the docfor is not within immediate reach, the little one should be placed at once in a warm bath with a cold compress on the head (a cool damp cloth), and the lowels evacuated as soon as possible.

"No solid food or milk should be given, excepting under doctor's orders, until the symptoms subside. Instead, barley water should be substituted."

### "CATERING TO SAVE BABY.

In cities where the infant welfare department is efficiently organized, modified milk can be obtained at the welfare stations or depots, adapted to the needs of bottle-fed babies of all ages. Not only is provision made to meet the needs of the babies who are developing normally, but also for the special cases, the little ones who are not thriving, or under special orders from doctors in charge

The necessity will be readily understood of having trained dispensers to prepare the food, of which a sufficient quantity is given out at a time to last wenty-four hours. The source of supply of milk can be kept under proper control, and assurance thus given that it has been obtained from tuberculin This means the health, and frequently the life, of the little ones who are to

be "the strength of the nation." Providing of prepared food at the welfare station is not the invariable rule

however. According to existing conditions each city and town follows the course which will best meet its needs. Sometimes instead of providing the nodified milk, mothers are educated in the preparation of this food. Education is one of the most important functions of the infant welfare department,

## WHAT COL. GARTSHORE SAW.

Apropos "Child Welfare," and the fact that the importance of the conservation of child life was urged by Col. Gartshore at a recent meeting of the Rotary Club, the realization of the need of a "baby saving department" for London is not a recent awakening for the chairman of the hospital board. One of the opportunities of which Col. Gartshore always takes advantage when on tusiness trips up and down the length and breadth of the country i that of visiting hospitals. Referring to this in connection with the subject of child welfare, he told this incident to the editor of Our Consumers' League department a few days ago:

"One of the things that made deep impression upon me was a visit paid to a Roman Catholic hospital in Vancouver. I was taken into the infants' department, where they receive any children brought to them, regardless of antece-I was struck with the healthy, happy, comfortable appearance of every one of the little things, ranging in ages from a few weeks to two years. Every one, practically, was in good condition, yet some of them were little waifs who but for the hospital, would have died or been neglected and under-nourished Improperly fed and cared for babies can't be expected to grow up into robust

## PROGRESS IN ECONOMY

It is interesting to note the effect of the great war undertaking here upon the habits of the people in their everyday purchases. For instance, eggs are a semi-luxury, and many people think they are an extravagance at high prices. and are reducing their daily consumption. An over-supply of eggs, it is said, has been placed in storage this year at high prices, with the expectation that the export demand would be heavy as it was last year, but Great Britain has advanced far in economy and English people have made up their minds to get along with fewer eggs. "Over there it is a matter of necessity," says a dealer in the New York Herald, who looks for lower prices here, "but in this country it seems to be a matter of principle." The high prices in butter are producing a similar effect and people are cutting down its use. The Herald quotes the vest side brokers as saying that there is an excellent chance of cheaper salmon this year, as it is the year of the big run of Puget Sound and Fraser River. which comes every four years, and should provide about 2,500,000 cases more than last year, when supply was about equal to consumption.

"I BELIEVE IN BUYING AHEAD AND STORING UP EVERY-THING THAT WILL KEEP. \$50 OR \$60 SPENT IN THE FALL ON FOOD GIVES GOOD DIVIDENDS. I ALSO BELIEVE IN CO-OPERATIVE BUYING DIRECT FROM THE FARMER. They knew that the best way to protect their own families against epidemics was to take measures to protect the whole community from epidemics, just as raising the moral and social standard of the community would make it a safer place for their own girls and boys to grow up in.
