

SYNOD OF HURON SETS MINIMUM FOR STIPENDS AT \$1,300

Canada An Excellent Place To
Begin Church Union, Says
Layman.

GIVEN CIVIC WELCOME

Total Receipts of Synod Over
\$18,000 More Than
Year Ago.

BRANTFORD, May 11.—The important question of ministerial stipends was settled for the Diocese of Huron at the meeting of the synod this afternoon, when the recommendation of Bishop Williams that the minimum stipend be \$1,200 for Juniors, with free rectory, was changed by amendment to \$1,300, without respect to seniority. A second amendment that the minimum be \$1,500 per annum was defeated. There was a lengthy debate on the matter.

Civic Welcome.
A civic welcome was extended the 300 delegates by Mayor MacBride, who reminded the synod that Queen Anne Church, near the city, was the oldest in the diocese. Col. W. J. W. of Windsor and Canon Gunn replied to the welcome. Rev. S. E. Marshall of the Brantford Ministerial Alliance adding to the same with the hope that Canada's divorce laws would be made most stringent.

Urges Church Union.
John Ranton of Canby, referring to the bishop's charge, stated that the forces of evil were many times worse than the forces of good in the country during the war. He asked that church union be furthered and declared that Canada was an excellent place for such union to commence. The cardinal points of Christian religion were identical in all great creeds. Minor points alone made a sectarian division.

Grace Church Leads.
In the returns for the Forward Movement it was found that Grace Church, Brantford, was leader.

Canon C. W. Vernon, Toronto, representing the Social Service Council, asked for a liberal fund, and stated that \$500,000 could be well used from the Forward Movement collection throughout the Dominion. The budget appropriation of \$59,030 for the diocese was reduced as subscribed to \$43,574. Total receipts from all sources were \$11,308, an increase from \$5,145 in 1919.

Should Be Only Cause.
At the session of the synod tonight the discussion on Bishop Williams' charge was continued.

The clause restricting divorce laws received considerable attention. Bishop Williams stated that the only real cause for divorce sanctioned by the church was adultery, and should divorce courts be established that should be the only cause permitted for separation. Quebec would have to be incorporated in Dominion legislation regardless of the desire of the Church of Rome. The discussion was finished at the time of adjournment.

Missionary Outfit.
Other phases of the report discussed included the correction of the Book of Canons, where deletion will be made and clauses substituted to take in the recommendations adopted on an increased clerical stipend.

The grant for a missionary outfit was increased from \$100 to \$200.

An hour-long discussion took place on the meeting of the term "home" as applied to the residence of a clergyman. That it should remain as indefinite as ever in the Book of Canons was the desire of the session.

**GO AHEAD WITH
BILL, MEMBERS
TELL PREMIER**

Government Caucus Supports
Drury On Superannuation
Bill Question.

TORONTO, May 11.—"They told me to go right ahead with it," said Premier Drury, referring to the attitude of Government supporters, in a caucus held before this afternoon's sitting of the Legislature, toward the superannuation of civil servants.

Following the letter of protest sent by J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, a petition was circulated among the Farmer members this morning requesting that the superannuation bill be left over for a year. The whole lot had a chilly reception. The "round robin" was being circulated by the Hon. Ross, Gengarray, and J. Cridland, North York South.

Addressed to the premier, the petition asked that the bill introduced recently be laid over for one year to give members a chance to study the matter before their constituents.

"Will any of the Farmer members oppose the passing of the bill?" the premier was asked.

"Some of them will, but it will be supported by quite a safe margin," he replied.

There is a spirit of resentment against Mr. Morrison's action, among many of the members, one of whom voiced the general feeling by saying, "The U. F. O. elected us, and now I think we can represent them without having constantly to be told what we should do."

**WOULD GIVE POWER
TO FIX PRICES OF GAS
TO ONT. COMMISSION**

Mills Introduces Bill To Further Conservation of Natural Gas.

TORONTO, May 11.—Further exploration and conservation of natural gas in Ontario is the purpose of a bill introduced by Hon. Harry Mills in the Legislature this afternoon. It is proposed to give the gas commissioner authority to fix natural gas prices in Ontario, where necessary "notwithstanding the terms of any special act or letters patent agreement franchise or bargain as between producer and consumer."

In introducing his measure the minister of mines said opposition was to be expected from those who had been able to secure their gas at very low rates. Copies of the bill would be sent to all municipalities affected. More uniformity in price, he contended, was necessary. Unless increased prices were forthcoming for some companies, they would have to go out of business.

**STRIKE OF HAMILTON
BAKERS IS SETTLED**
