GOVT. OFFERS TO
PAY ONE-THIRD

Extensive Public Works May
Be Undertaken at
Windsor.

WINDSOR, Dec. 29.—Provided negotiations now pending between Mayor Winter and Premier Drury regarding assistance from the province toward the financial cost of providing municipal work for the unemployed on the border are satisfactory, as expected, an extensive campaign of public works improvement in Windsor will be undertaken immediately. Thousands of dollars on required improvements will be involved. Mayor Winter told The Advertiser tonight.

In reply to a wire sent by Mayor Winter to Premier Drury inquiring as to what share of the cost of work undertaken by the municipality to provide employment the Government would be willing to bear, a letter was received tonight from the office of the premier stating that the Provincial Government is willing to contribute, if relief on any substantial scale appears to be necessary, one-third of the amount actually disbursed.

GARMENT WORKERS
IN BALTIMORE STRIKE

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 29.—About 1,000 garment workers employed in 20 or 30 of the smaller clothing factories here went on strike today in obedience to orders from the local business agent of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers' Union, who said the chief point at issue is an effort on the part of the manufacturers to reduce wages to the 1919 level, a cut averaging 25 to 30 per cent. That a wage reduction is being sought is admitted by several manufacturers, who declared that the trade no longer bears the wage scale demanded by employees.

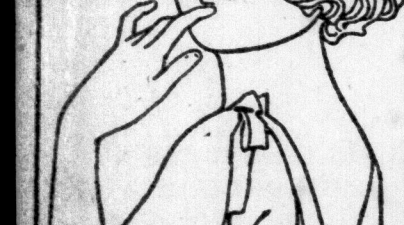

WITHDRAWN ARMY,
IS LABOR PLEA

British Labor Party Suggests
Irish Assembly To Form
Constitution.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—A movement calculated by its organizers to place the full support of the government to the support of the Irish self-determination claims began with a specially convened conference of the parliamentary labor party in London today, after which several members of the party's commission which investigated the situation in Ireland told of what they had observed and learned there.

A resolution was adopted unanimously challenging the government to discontinue the commission's investigations regarding reprisals and other outrages charged to the crown forces. The conference was held as a curtain raiser for a campaign in behalf of self-determination, and the policy of repression to be inaugurated by the labor party in the coming year.

Mr. Cameron, chairman of today's conference, in opening the lengthy discussion on the inquiry, said it was the "serious indictment against British imperialism" to have a commission placed before the British people. The speaker declared that the commission was a "cover for the British Empire" and that the labor party was determined to "bring the British Empire to its knees."

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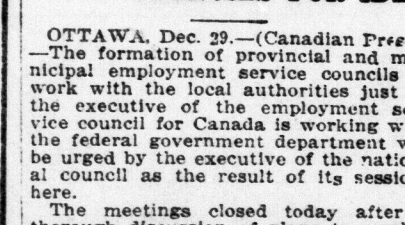
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To Renew Rum War

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—Renewed efforts to check illegal sales of liquor in the United States will form part of the new year resolutions of Prohibition Commissioner Kramer, who announced today plans for reducing the number of federal permits for the handling of liquor in the next twelve months. It is intended to discontinue from 50 to 75 per cent of the existing wholesale licenses, and to curtail retail licenses as well.

According to the commissioner, greatest trouble in enforcing the dry laws has been experienced in the Great Lakes cities and all border points, both Canadian and Mexican. The Atlantic seaboard has also been a tough proposition for the "dry" officers. It is believed that reduction of the number of wholesale licenses will assist in enforcement of the law in these regions.

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—Inspector Montgomery admitted to T. Herbert Lennox, K. C., in today's police court, that the charge against J. Jamieson for having liquor for sale had been laid immediately after the dismissal of a previous charge against him. In the present case, said the inspector, Jamieson received 60 bottles and got rid of 23 bottles in five days.

It was stated that none of the companies' employees had been discharged and that the number of productions will be increased rather than diminished.
