ALD. JAS. HALE SPEAKS AT TEMPERANCE MEETING

Says Many Refined Women of Toronto Take Booze With Them to Summer Resorts.

HAMILTON, Nov. 24.—(Special.)—"I will vouchsafe that there are hundreds of refined women in Toronto who would not think of going to a summer resort without a flask of something strong," was the statement of Ald. Jas. Hales of Toronto at the temperance meeting in St. Andrew's Church to-night. He added that the women generally had the excuse that they took the liquor with them in the car, and in emergency, "Ald. Hales was the chief speaker at the second of the all-week series of temperance meetings. He wanted to know why the drink should not be interfered with as well as gambling, cock fighting and other public nuisances.

The police raided the place in the hope of catching the gang shooting crap, but when they got in there was no evidence of such a game, and the men were in hiding all over the stable. It is unlikely that a prosecution will take place.

Altho the writ in Smith v. the Cataract Power Company and the city to upset the power agreement entered into in July, was served on the company only yesterday, the case will proceed with at the non-jury sittings which open next Monday. The grounds on which the plaintiff will try to set the agreement are that the city council had no right to enter into a contract with a corporation for a term of years, which does not begin until a year after the council goes out of power, and that the contract was contrary to the expressed will of the people.

William Dillon of the Bayview Hotel was fined \$60 for selling liquor on Sunday, and his bartender was fined \$10 for being in the bar. Henry Golden of the Turbina Hotel was fined \$10 for having his doors closed on Sunday morning. The Condon, also charged with not complying with the commissioners' regulations, was charged with a similar charge against the proprietor of the Dominion Hotel who was enlarged.

Hospital Governors. Political Intelligence

The Buffalo Express has a despatch from Toronto alleging that between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000 were contributed to the Liberal campaign fund by the Standard Oil Company. "Ontario results," it is said, "were a sad blow to the Conservatives. They say that up to a week before election day, Ontario was theirs by a majority sufficient to sweep the enemy off the face of Ontario earth. Then, they say, came the cash, barrels of it, and when the polls closed, Ontario had done no better than the main party."

Tariff concessions are said to be the motive for this unusual generosity on the part of the Octopus. One would think that if three million dollars had been aloft for a week in Ontario some one would have noticed it, but the correspondent contents himself with saying:

"Conservatives here, if they are up against anything like the reputed power and resources of the oil trust, say they ought to know it. Altho they have not proved it up to date, they are very positive that the virtual collapse of their campaign in Ontario was not brought about by such means as are countenanced and permitted under the terms of the Dominion Elections Act."

On the other hand, Liberals are making similar charges in regard to a number of Ontario constituencies.

The Winnipeg Free Press, The St. John's News, The Toronto Star, and other Liberal papers are presenting against the proposed "melon cutting" by the C.P.R. They insist that the company has no right to distribute \$50,000,000 in new stock to its shareholders.

This is not a new doctrine in this country, altho these newspapers are recent converts to it. There was a similar "melon cutting" four years ago, when F. Maclean, M.P. for South York, protested against it, he received no encouragement or support from these journals. It will be remembered in this connection that when the Bell Telephone Company obtained authority from parliament to increase its capital stock by \$20,000,000, the same member proposed an amendment requiring the stock to be offered for sale at auction and shares not sold for want of bidders may be sold for the company at private sale, but for no less than their market value.

This amendment was voted down. The members of the present house who voted for it were: Mr. Armstrong, Barr, Blain, Broder, Chisholm (Huron), Daniel, Lator, Lancaster, Macdonald, Macpherson, McPherson, Reid (Greenville), Roche (Marquette), Sproule, Staples, Wilson (Lennox and Addington), and Wright (Muskegon).

Hon. Clifford Sifton did not vote upon the amendment. Does The Winnipeg Free Press correctly express its opinion in regard to a corporation's "cutting a melon?"

If the landslide which appeared to R. L. Borden and some of his lieutenants would have been shattered right and left, according to what those who claim to have been paid for it are saying, here is the way in which they say the managers of the party in Ontario had arranged matters: First of all, Hon. W. J. Hanna would have had a leading portfolio in recognition both of his great platform and administrative ability, and of the great service he rendered his country from 1876 to 1896.

Hon. J. J. Foy, attorney-general, was to be presented with a seat on the bench commensurate with his gifts as a lawyer of the highest standing, and would have caused a double opening of South Toronto, and Claude Macdonnell was to be awarded the attorney-generalship of the province.

R. L. Brockin, secretary of the West Kent Liberal Association, says there'd be a cross petition.

Hon. J. P. Burchill, recently nominated by the Liberals for Northumberland, N. B., as their candidate for the local legislature, wired from New York that he is prepared to accept the nomination and stand for the Tories, not as a government opponent, but as an independent Liberal, willing to give the Hazen government independent support.

H. Mercier, ex-M.L.A., and a son of the late Premier Mercier, was nominated to contest Chateauguay in the Liberal interest.

The Montreal Herald (Lib.) is taking a hand in the choice of Mr. R. L. Borden's successor, assuming that he intends to resign the leadership. It prefers Premier McBride, and fears that Sir James Whitney's fiery temperament would not do at Ottawa.

"At Ottawa," says The Herald, "the leader who permits himself the indulgence of raising his voice above the tone of the assembly is lost. It is not that the tone is lower; on the contrary, it is higher, but it is a long step from Cape Breton to Vancouver Island, and in between there are several groups of men who hold in utter honesty and absolute conviction views which are in some cases diametrically opposed to those held by others, and in other cases do come within the normal cognizance or sympathy of the others at large."

A man with a hot temper like Sir James Whitney would not be capable of leading those who differ from a man with a phlegmatic disposition like Mr. Borden's has been able to.
