FATALITY, SEVERAL DEATHS MARK DAY IN HAMILTON

Pugilist Frank Erie "Doped"—Man May Die From Burns Received While Smoking.

HAMILTON, Aug. 8.—(Special)—A big crowd attended the Canadian championship swimming contest held at the beach Saturday afternoon by the Hamilton Swimming Club, E. E. Lockhart, Toronto Swimming Club, won the one mile championship and J. Kerry of Montreal, got the half mile, and F. Lawrence-Hamilton, won the 220 yards breast championship.

The Toronto Swimming Club life-guard crew won the Canadian championship. This is the first time the championship has been contested for.

The victory of the Toronto over the Hamilton crew was conclusive—24 points to 8—and the winners walked off with the four handsome silver cups presented. The Toronto were represented by J. Vernon, W. Mowat, E. Milling and W. Hamilton, and out of the four events they won 3 firsts and 3 seconds. The competition was under the Royal Life-Saving Society rules and demonstrated four methods of rescuing those in peril of drowning, viz: the ordinary rescue, getting the victim from behind, rescuing those who struggle violently, and assisting a drowner crumpled swimmer. The "victim" was 25 yards out in the water and his team mate had to get him in as quickly as possible. Mowat, one of the winners, also holds a medal for a similar championship in Great Britain, won at the Glasgow competition. Results: 100 yards open—E. O. Bath, Oakville Swimming Club, 1; A. H. EMPLOYES ORGANIZE. Former Paris Postal Workers in Competition With Government.

PARIS, Aug. 8.—One hundred and fifty of the late employees of the Paris postoffice, dismissed as a result of the strike, have organized a competition with the government for the distribution of newspapers, circulars, collection of accounts, etc. The association, which calls itself the Laborious, expects to begin operations on Tuesday, and claims the promised patronage of nearly 100,000 business houses. It has engaged commodious headquarters and adopted an attractive trademark and uniform for its employees. It was conceived as a means by which discharged strikers might earn a livelihood. The scheme developed and obtained pledges of support which promise to build up the greatly needed industry.

RE-INTERRED PRIESTS' BODIES. Strangely Impressive Funeral Rites Are Witnessed in St. John, N.B.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Aug. 8.—(Special)—Escorted by a procession of hundreds of members of the Family of the Holy Name of St. Peter's Church, the altar boys and priests of the Redemptorist Order, the remains of four priests and two brothers of the Redemptorist order were this afternoon removed from the old St. Peter's burying ground and reinterred in a plot beside the present St. Peter's Church. Heading the procession was the City Cornet Band, a cross-bearer and acolytes followed, and then walked hundreds of men and boys of the parish each with crepe on his arm. Two conveyances covered with a black pall bore each three caskets. Acolytes with red lights walked on each side, and the pall bearers, prominent members of St. Peter's Church, followed. In the new resting place a monument to the memory of the dead religious has been erected. The names on it are: Rev. Stephen J. Krien, Rev. Peter Trimble, Rev. Michael Corduke, Rev. John Nep Tensch, and Brothers Jeremiah Krief and John Leo Will. All have died while stationed at St. Peter's.

TURKEY IS DETERMINED TO TAKE HOLD OF CRETE. Serves Notice on Greece That Annexation Must Be Disapproved or There'll Be Trouble.

ATHENS, Greece, Aug. 8.—The Turkish Government has communicated to Greece an urgent note asking that she express her disapproval of the annexation agitation in Crete, and formally declare that Greece has no ambitions regarding the island. Otherwise, the note adds, diplomatic relations will be severed.

REGARDED AS ACUTE. BERLIN, Aug. 8.—German Government circles regard the situation between Turkey and Greece as being in a most acute stage, when four made representations to both Constantinople and Athens, urging the necessity of a peaceable settlement of the Cretan question.

TURKEY DETERMINED. KASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Turkey will stand by what she regards as her rights in her controversy with Greece, over the island of Crete. Such is her attitude as communicated to the United States state department and to the European powers. She is determined there shall be a return to the conditions preceding the Turko-Grecian war of a dozen years ago, when four of the powers of Europe, England, Russia, France and Italy, landed troops and despatched ships to pacify the Cretans. Political discontent kept the island in insurrection for 70 years until the allied powers intervened in 1898. They gave the island autonomy, with a high commissioner named by the King of Greece. The currency is Greek, as is the language of the people. The decisive policy of the Turkish Government is ascribed to the progressive and determined attitude of the new regime in that country. This contrasted with the apparent indifference of the administration of Abdul Hamid, which made no serious effort to bring about a settlement of the anomalous conditions existing in Crete.

SUBSCRIBING FOR ARMAMENT. PATERSON, N. J., Aug. 8.—To raise a fund of \$100,000 to purchase for modern guns for the Greek artillery is the mission of Spiro Mochovena, a Greek patriot, who came to this country from Athens two weeks ago. Thus far he has collected about \$20,000 from fellow countrymen in Greater New York and in New Jersey. The guns are to be used in the conflict with Turkey, which Mochovena deems inevitable.
