The Postmaster-General's Bill Passed
Its Third Reading—Boon To Cities.

Ottawa, June 16.—Hon. Mr. Le-
mieux's bill establishing a one-cent
drop letter rate in cities where there
is free delivery came up in the House
of Commons tonight, and was read a
third time.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth's bill to re-
strict the sale of tobacco to minors
was put through committee. The age
limit in the bill was changed from 16
to 18 years on motion of Mr. Miller
(South Grey).

Mr. Richard Blain (Peel) wanted
complete prohibition of importation,
manufacture and sale of cigarettes,
and gave notice that in the third read-
ing he would move to so amend it.

Before the House adjourned at mid-
night two items were passed, one of
\$200,000 for the Canadian exhibit at Im-
perial Institute, London.

In the Senate.

In the Senate Senator Beique's bill
respecting juvenile delinquents was
given a third reading, an amendment
being added, giving juvenile court
judges power to impose shorter sen-
tences than other judges have author-
ity to impose.

Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, deputy to
the Governor-General, attended at 4
o'clock and gave assent to 45 bills
which had passed both houses, includ-
ing the supply bill.
