Newcastle, Dec. 18.—Mrs. Charles Lyons, of Harcourt, who died on Thursday evening at the residence of her son, James, at Millerton, was buried at Grandville today. Rev. Dr. Conroy, of Newcastle, officiated at the grave and at a preliminary service at the residence of Alfred Ward, Harcourt. Mr. and Mrs. Lyons and Miss Jessie Lyons accompanied the remains from Millerton. Deceased had been in bad health since September. She was 78 years old. She is survived by her husband, who is 85; her son, James, of Millerton, and a daughter, Mrs. Wm. Lawson, of St. John.

John Butler

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 19.—John E. Butler, harbor master of Halifax, died this afternoon on a street, he died while on his way to attending some business at the railway wharves.

Mr. Butler was a prominent son of the wharves and was at one time grand warden of Nova Scotia. He was appointed by the Conservative government and was more than seventy years old.

BOGUS COUNT AND WIFE GET TWO YEAR TERM

Were Accused for Swindling Paris Jeweller Out of \$40,000

Gubata Posed as Bourbon But Was a Former Dishwasher in New York Hotel and Married Widow With Several Children

Paris, Dec. 19.—The bogus count Gubata and his American wife, who were accused of swindling jeweller Fontana out of \$40,000 were found guilty today and condemned to two years' imprisonment each and together to a fine of \$200. This pair have had a remarkable career. The man, who called himself Count Gubata and said he was the son of the Archduke Othon of Austria, was formerly a dish washer at the Hotel Beauchamp in New York, and to a cook by trade. He is quite young, while his wife was the mother of seven children by her first husband. Gubata's right name is Othmar Gubata and he was born at Scharding, in Upper Austria. He is alleged to have been mixed up in a number of swindles in New York and other cities, and in San Francisco, posed as Count Eugene Harbach. He has also at various times called himself Prince Charles of Bourbon and Archduke Albrecht of Austria. At another time he said he was the heir to the Bulgarian throne. At times he has been an actor and a sailor. The woman was a daughter or adopted daughter of Baron de Thomsen, who amassed a fortune in Brazil and was made a baron by the late Don Pedro. De Thomsen afterwards went to New York, where he died at the Hotel Buckingham in 1898, leaving \$1,000,000. His daughter, who had married a man named Beck, contested his will. She was represented by Joseph H. Choate. The case was settled out of court and she received a large share of the estate. Prior to his death, Baron de Thomsen was engaged in the Brazilian trade and had offices in Wall Street. Beck, the woman's husband, died a few years after his father-in-law and in 1908, according to the general story, the woman married Gubata civilly in Zurich, Switzerland.

Afterward the couple went to New York and were married according to the rites of the Catholic church at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, of which the Rev. Father Taylor is the pastor. Friends of the woman said in her behalf that Gubata had made her believe he really was a count, and that she has only been a partner in his operations through her love for him.

AMHERST NEWS

Several Accidents—A Presentation—Seventh Day Adventists' Campaign

Amherst, N. S., Dec. 17.—Two serious accidents have recently occurred at the Amherst branch of the Canada Car Company here. On Wednesday James Sanderson, employed in the axle department, was struck in the lower extremity of the body by a pair of very heavy grapping tongs, inflicting a terrible wound which necessitated a serious operation. He is now in the Hospital View Hospital in a critical condition.

Yesterday, Pearl Russell had his foot crushed by a 400-pound piece of iron falling across his instep.

J. R. Lamy while going to his residence from his office a few evenings ago, slipped on the icy pavement, sustaining a serious shaking up.

R. Barry Chapman, an aged citizen also died owing to the icy condition of the sidewalk. He fractured his thigh.

Miss C. Wilson broke her arm from the same cause.

Word from Iona, (Ont.), tells of the death of John Lowther, aged 88, a brother of Mrs. Rufus Lowther of Hantsford street. He was a native of Fenwick, this county and went to Ontario as a young man and had been very successful.

Miss Sadie Steeves, who has been stenographer in the trunk department of Christie Bros., Co., Ltd. for some time has resigned and will leave on Monday for her home in Hillsboro, (N. B.). The young people of the First Baptist church presented to Miss Steeves a very valuable gold signet ring suitably engraved with the church and choir and will be greatly missed.
