C. C. Ballantyne, a member of the Montreal harbor commission is in the city, a guest at the Royal. This afternoon, the mayor and Alderman McGooldrich accompanied Mr. Ballantyne on a visit to the west side wharves and terminal facilities.

The residents in the vicinity of the Estill house on Manawagonish road are complaining considerably of the actions of the two elder boys, who it is alleged surreptitiously milk cows belonging to the neighbors and are nuisances otherwise. The name of the deserted woman sent recently to the municipal house was Mrs. James McCordick.

Seymour McKnight, of Lower Millstream, was badly kicked by a horse one day this week and severely injured. The animal was in the pasture and Mr. McKnight, who was repairing a fence, attempted to drive it away. He struck the horse with the handle of a hammer and received a terrific kick on the side of the face. The wound was a severe one and medical attendance had to be summoned. (Sussex Record.)

A very pretty sight this morning is to be seen in the harbor where the large full rigged Italian ship Audrea, 1636 tons net is at anchor from Barbadoes. The ship was loaded with sugar and was at one time one of the Robert's fleet sailing out of Liverpool.

NOT MUCH DEVELOPED AT TODAY'S SESSION OF THE CENTRAL RY. COMMISSION

(Continued from Page 1.)

In the pass book was furnished by Mr. Atkinson in Mr. McAvity's office.

An item of \$12,500 from the New Brunswick government under date of May 16, 1907, appeared on page 96 of the cash book but was not in the pass book. Witness said his recollection was that this amount was deposited in the bank of British North America, in New York and was partly used for purchasing locomotives and machinery and the balance appeared in the pass book as a transfer.

In answer to Mr. Powell witness said that in making his audit he had endeavored to find out about this book of loss on the operation of the road.

Witness said it was his recollection that \$2,500 had been paid Mr. McAvity as president of the N. B. Coal & Railway after the commission had assumed control, left over by the N. B. Coal & Railway. He had not seen the books since the present commission took control.

There was no regular time, the witness said, for him to make up the cash books. The work was done at irregular intervals between visits to Norton.

In answer to Mr. Powell, witness said he did not know that Brown Bros. were paid anything in addition to their contract price. He understood that some claims against Brown Bros. were paid by the railway. He did not know if they were in excess of the contract price.

Several statements prepared by Mr. Corbett in connection with the audits were put in evidence.

There was a "lock ledger" the witness said, that Mr. McAvity had in his office which he had frequently worked on. He did not think this book had been handed to the new commissioners. This book was copied from the cash book and a classification of the moneys received from his government.

To Mr. Barnhill witness said there was nothing in the lock ledger that could not be made up from the cash book. Adjustment was made at this point until this afternoon.

POLICE COURT

The police court docket this morning was unusually scanty, but three arrests having been made last night.

Owing to the absence of Judge Ritchie, who is in Halifax with the St. Peter's aggregation of labor troubles, Police Clerk Henderson occupied the bench.

John Simpson, a stranger, who was arrested for intoxication on Broad street last night, deposited eight dollars and appeared in court this morning somewhat under the influence of liquor accompanied by a local character, who was also in a similar condition. In answer to a query from Mr. Henderson, Simpson declared that he had not taken a drink prior to coming to court this morning, but his actions betrayed him.

A fine of four dollars was imposed, which was paid and Acting Chief Jenkins refunded his deposit.

Richard Scott and Isaac Takels were also fined the same amount in default of which they will labor ten days each for the city.

HALIFAX PILOT DEAD.

Halifax, N. S., July 10. (Special.)—Pilot James Fleming of Ketch Harbor, died this morning, aged 97 years.

S.S. Calvin Austin Brought 550 Passengers This Morning--Six Race Horses Arrive.

Eastern Steamship Company's steamer Calvin Austin, Capt. Pike, arrived this morning at nine o'clock from Boston direct with 550 passengers. The steamer brought this trip a large number of tourists who will stop in the city a few days and afterwards travel through the maritime provinces. Six trotting horses came by the steamer, they are owned by D. L. Bryson, of West Newton and they will be taken to Moosepath Park this morning. The names of the string are as follows: Dr. Brand, with a record of 2:15 1/4 entered in the 215 class for the maritime circuit; Pointer Patch, (2:18 1/4), for circuit; Prince Altondey (2:22 1/4), both for the 2:20 pace. Catherine E., green mare, for the 2:20, also another green horse.

Captain Pike says the trip down from Boston was very fine and cool all the way. The Governor Cobbe, and all the captains say that this summer the travel will be larger than any previous years.
