Mrs. Shannon appeared in court this morning with a number of others from her neighborhood, including Mrs. Hattie. An aunt of the prisoner was also present, as well as several of his friends. The women who came to give evidence were told by his honor that they would not be heard today, and their presence was not required, and they withdrew.

Mrs. Shannon was the only witness examined, and when placed on the stand testified that her name was Amelia Shannon; she was married and was 17 years of age.
