

PRaises Judge of Police Court

Mrs. D. Lamb of Salvation Army Occupies Place on Bench

Salvation Army Leader Speaks of Magistrate Henderson's Dealing With Prisoners.

Mrs. David C. Lamb, the first woman to be made a Justice of the Peace in England, who conducts a court in London, England, sat upon the Police Court bench this morning by invitation of Police Magistrate Henderson.

Mrs. Lamb was deeply impressed with the fact that there were only two cases before the bench on a Monday morning. She said that with all the abuses of prohibition, she had yet to be convinced that it was not a good thing.

Her husband, she said, was a great proponent of the winter time. She was greatly pleased with the flowing audience last evening in the Imperial Theatre at the evangelistic service, that 60 people had gone forward through that vast audience, expressing their intention of making a start in the Christian life.

Commissioner and Mrs. Lamb will be at the Evangeline Home this afternoon at a social hour for tea and for service in the evening. Tomorrow morning they will motor to Fredericton to interview the Provincial Government officials and on Wednesday will go to Moncton, and from there to Halifax.

Commissioner Charles Swinton of the Canadian Salvation Army, accompanied by Colonel Adby, will leave this afternoon for Montreal and Toronto. In the latter city they hope to meet Mrs. Booth, who is to arrive in New York, and will be en route to Winnipeg.

TO MEET ON FRIDAY. A meeting of the committee of the Saint John Board of Trade on economic readjustment will be held in the board rooms on Friday afternoon of this week. W. F. Burditt is chairman. Letters have been sent out to the members of the committee outlining the problems of the economic situation in the Maritimes and it is expected that much information will be submitted.

MAY BE BY-LAW. Commissioner Harding said this morning that complaints had been made by the fire underwriters of the burning off of paint from buildings by use of torches. 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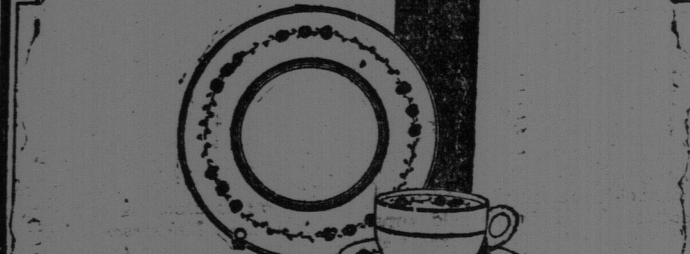
