"While the court of Saint John has for its judge such men as Judge Henderson, justice will always be done, tempered with a Christian spirit," said Mrs. Lamb, when interviewed this morning after the court had closed. "The tone he employs in speaking to the prisoners should send everyone convicted by Judge Henderson to his or her cell, ashamed of their misdoing and with a resolve to do better, when given opportunity. "I go from Saint John with a glad heart that such a wise, kind man occupies the bench of the city court." Mrs. David C. Lamb, the first woman


