

NEW BRUNSWICK MEN IN POLITICAL TALK IN OTTAWA

Correspondent Speaks of Copp, Foster and Pugsley in Reviewing Situation.

An Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Gazette under Saturday's date has the following of interest here:

"The appointment of H. B. McGivern, senior member for Ottawa, to the cabinet without portfolio, is the first step in the much discussed cabinet re-organization. Premier King's next step will depend on several things, and chief amongst them will be the result in the Northumberland, N. B., by-election. A Liberal representative, and constituency, and the election of another Liberal might tempt the Premier to reconstruct his cabinet in so far as representation from the Maritime Provinces is concerned.

"It is no secret that the Liberal defeat in Kent, N. B., last year managed the political reputation of Hon. Arthur Copp, the Secretary of State, and New Brunswick's representative in the cabinet, and Mr. Copp has been anxious to return to his native province if a suitable vacancy should offer itself. The appointment of Chief Justice McKeown of New Brunswick to the chairmanship of the railway board, renders the position of Chief Justice of New Brunswick vacant, and if a Liberal is returned in Northumberland, it might result in Mr. Copp being appointed to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, with a resultant vacancy in his constituency in Westmorland county.

"Mr. Walter Foster, former premier of New Brunswick, would then be invited to join the cabinet. He is an intimate friend of Premier King, and the most powerful political force in New Brunswick. The speech delivered on Maritime rights by Hon. William Pugsley two weeks ago in Halifax, is regarded here also as significant, and an indication that the former Minister of Public Works in the Laurier cabinet may return to active political life again and contest St. John city in the Liberal interests. With Mr. Pugsley on the Government benches, Mr. King would not need to be so afraid of the attacks of Mr. Meighen, as Mr. Meighen is about the only parliamentarian who can successfully cross swords with Mr. King.

"Mr. King can undoubtedly strengthen his cabinet if he will take the plunge, but he will not try his luck too often in by-elections if he can avoid them. He is determined to rest on the laurels gained in St. Antoine, and will make a tour of the west, with the result that election as the chief fact of his speeches. At the same time he does not desire himself even as to that result. A series of unusual circumstances there made his luck for him, and it is questionable if they can occur again.

Cardin Going West
"Mr. King will speak in Northumberland and then leave for the west. Amongst those accompanying him will be Hon. Mr. Cardin, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. It is said here that since the result of the St. Antoine election Mr. Cardin, who had charge of the Liberal interests, has risen high in Mr. King's esteem, and that to show it he is bringing him even as to that result. DELIGHTED WITH ST. JOHN VISIT
Hamilton Canadian Club Delegates Impressed by the Maritimes.
The Hamilton Spectator, reporting the return home of the delegates of that city to the recent Canadian Club meetings in St. John, says:

The people showed a decided interest in Ontario's representatives."
"The business depression is still noticeable in the maritime provinces, according to Mr. Ilsey, although it is not so keenly felt as it is here.

NEW TURN GIVEN KEYMEN'S STRIKE

Action Followed by Statement by Canadian Press Gen. Manager.

Toronto, Sept. 22—A new turn was given the dispute between the Canadian Press and its former telegraphers, now on strike, by the decision of the latter today to accept the offer of the Minister of Labor at Ottawa of a board of conciliation. The Minister granted this board at the request of the Canadian Press, which latter nominating its president, E. Norman Smith, of the Ottawa Journal, as its representative. The men refused to appoint a representative and went on strike at 24 hours' notice a week ago last Thursday. They now have notified the Minister of Labor that they have appointed J. G. O'Donoghue, K.C., of Toronto, as their representative.
"The company has always offered to arbitrate," said General Manager J. F. B. Livesey today, "and so far as we are concerned this dispute has never been a question of wages. The men made exorbitant demands of a wage increase to which we replied by a notice of a small reduction which we think fair, seeing that since the agreement was made four years ago the cost of living has tumbled. We offered to arbitrate the question of increase or decrease under the arbitration clause we contend was inserted in the agreement for that very purpose. Or we would first of all arbitrate the interpretation of that clause. The men refused, offering instead to arbitrate only the existing wage or an increase, which from the company's angle was absurd. Being then threatened with a strike, we applied as a public utility to the Minister of Labor for a board of conciliation, which was then granted. The men struck in this and in doing so, placed themselves on very insecure grounds."
In his statement, Mr. Livesey said that no newspaper had failed to receive a news service since the strike began. He said that automatic printers were being installed for copying the news report, and one circuit already was working. Some of the men, he said, had returned to work, and it was regrettable that places could not be found for all the 77 who went out.

"I today received a letter from the strikers' general chairman," went on Mr. Livesey, "when after notifying us that they were appointing their members to the board of conciliation. Mr. Clark went on as follows: 'This will be your official notification that all telegraphers in your employ are being instructed to return to work effective with all night shifts, Monday, Sept. 22.'
Issues Ultimatum.
"This strikes the management as a little naive. They went out on strike and by that act ceased to be employees of the company. It is an unfortunate fact that we cannot take them all back even if we so desired.
"I am replying to Mr. Clark," said Mr. Livesey, "by sending him a memorandum of the conditions under which alone we can take back to work such of our former employees as we can find positions for. They must agree to these conditions and they must come back individually."
The memorandum sets out that, because of the course adopted by the men, the company cannot longer recognize the men's union and that the future course of the company depends on whether the company can secure adequate protection against attempted paralysis of its functions as in the present case. It is impossible to state now how many of the men will be taken back, but any taken on now must be on a temporary basis. The seniority list is declared cancelled, and the men who have already returned will head the new list. The scale of wages will be the same as before the strike on the understanding that any changes arrived at by negotiation will be retroactive to the date of re-employment. Only Morse telegraphers will be included in any new agreement.

EXPECTS GOOD ST. LAWRENCE YEAR

C. P. R. Announces Schedule of Montreal and Quebec Sailings.
Following on the announcement of the winter sailings from the port of St. John, as announced in The Times-Star, the Canadian Pacific gives its schedule for the 1925 season on the St. Lawrence highway. This early announcement of the activities of the coming year, given out in the rush of the present season of record travel, strikes a note of optimism and "business as usual."
There will be 92 arrivals and departures all told, and the company will operate 12 ships on the six services maintained between Canada and Europe. These services are: (1) Montreal to Belfast and Glasgow; (2) Quebec to Belfast and Glasgow; (3) Montreal to Liverpool; (4) Quebec to Liverpool; (5) Montreal to Cherbourg; (6) Montreal to Southampton and Antwerp; (7) Quebec to Cherbourg, Southampton and Hamburg.
Over Route 1 the Marburn will make eight complete trips, the Montreal eight and the Metagana seven. Over Route 2 the Montclair will travel eight times during the season. Over Route 3 the Montclair, the Montrose and the Montclare will make eight each, a total of 24. Over Route 4 the Montroyal will steam seven times during the summer. Route 5 will be traversed seven times by the Melita and eight times by the Minnedosa. The latter ship on her first trip will call at Pauliac on the way to Antwerp. Over Route 6 the Empress of Scotland will make eight complete trips. The Empress of France, which docks at New York at the end of her long cruise round the world, will sail from that port instead of from Quebec, and will go no farther than Southampton; on her second trip she will sail from Quebec to Cherbourg and Southampton without proceeding to Hamburg, but the remainder of her schedule is regular and she will make five round trips between the ports of Quebec and Cherbourg, Southampton and Hamburg.
