## Chicago Civic Opera Deficit Is \$351,718

Season Most Successful Ever Held in City, With Receipts \$68,091 More Than Previous Year.

Chicago, June 28.—Although the first season of the Chicago Civic Opera Company finished with a loss of \$351,718, the trustees at their annual meeting described it as the most successful financially in the history of operation in Chicago. The total receipts for the ten weeks in Chicago and three weeks on the road were \$68,091 greater than the preceding season, and the prediction is that they will be still larger next season.

The deficit to be made up among the 2,200 guarantors of the company who will be taxed only 70 per cent. of what they pledged at the beginning of the season. Twenty-six operas were presented last season and seventy-two performances were given, five more than the preceding year. Plans for the coming season are for eighty-five performances. The ten weeks in Chicago is to be extended to eleven and a half weeks, and the road tour, which lasted three weeks last season, also is to be prolonged.

The Chicago performances netted \$737,770.23, while the income from the road tour totaled \$22,486.89. Balanced against the total receipts, \$964,257.12, were expenses amounting to \$1,395,925.70.

Mr. Insull was re-elected president and General Charles G. Dawes vice-president. L. B. Kuppenheimer was

elected vice-president to succeed Richard T. Crane, Jr., who resigned. Charles L. Hutchinson and Stanley Field were re-elected treasurer and secretary respectively.

## ETHEL BARRYMORE SUES FOR DIVORCE AFTER SEPARATION

Papers Filed in Providence Reveal Failure of the Marital Career of Noted Actress—Peace Efforts are Futile.

Providence, June 28.—After threatening since 1911 to divorce Russell G. Colt, of this city, son of the late Colonel Samuel P. Colt, millionaire rubber king, whom she married in 1909 at Hyde Park, Mass., in the rectory of the Roman Catholic Church of the Precious Blood, Ethel Barrymore, stage celebrity for more than a quarter of a century, has actually started proceedings for divorce, it was learned here.

Papers in the suit have been filed in the Superior Court of this state, and the case is set for hearing during next week. The belief prevails here that her husband will not contest the suit.

Miss Barrymore's attorney arranged for service of the writ on Mr. Colt at the cigar stand of the Biltmore Hotel here on April 28.

Simultaneous with this information it became known that Countess Eleanor Curran Moroni has filed suit in the Superior Court for divorce from Count Girolamo Moroni. Countess Moroni, together with Mr. and Mrs. Colt and their three children, was a beneficiary under the will of Colonel Colt. She charges non-support and desertion.

Although action to divorce the son of the late president of the United States Rubber Company has seemed imminent since a few years after their marriage, the news that a suit was actually started by Miss Barrymore was a surprise to friends of the couple in this city.

Shared in Colt Estate. Under the terms of the will of Colonel Colt, Russell G. Colt, Ethel Barrymore Colt, his wife, and their three children were all named as beneficiaries. Mr. Colt, besides receiving outright \$100,000, also received one-sixth of the residuary estate and Linden Place, the beautiful summer residence of the Colts at Bristol for a home for himself and his family.

In addition to a joint share with her husband in the estate owned by Colonel Colt at Mamamock, N. Y., and occupied by her and her children, Miss Barrymore received \$25,000 in cash by the terms of the will. Each of the three children was given \$50,000.

Precious to her marriage Miss Barrymore was several times reported engaged to others, including Laurence Irving and Captain Henry Graham. Her engagement to Mr. Colt came as a great surprise to Miss Barrymore's friends. She met Mr. Colt through her brother, John Barrymore, who became acquainted with the Providence man while the latter was a student at Yale. Mr. Barrymore introduced Mr. Colt to his sister in London.

Miss Barrymore is a daughter of the late Maurice Barrymore and George Barrymore, stage celebrities of their time. She was born in 1878. Her stage debut was in 1895. Mr. and Mrs. Colt have three children, Samuel Pomeroy, named after his paternal grandfather; John Drew and Ethel Colt. The children at present make their home with their mother in New York.

A statement issued in New York on

more, announced that she and Mr. Colt had separated. The announcement settled for that time the intermittent rumors of ten years. It disclosed that there would be no suit for divorce and that the actress would have the custody of the three children.

"Mr. Colt's Fault"

The grounds for separation were not set forth. John Drew, Miss Barrymore's uncle, said they might be expressed as "domestic infelicity," adding that "whatever the cause is, it's Mr. Colt's fault."

Miss Barrymore was released from Flower Hospital the day the statement was issued, following operations in Cleveland and here upon her fingers and tonsils, which had become infected.

ed. The operations in Cleveland interrupted a tour of "Declasse."

A month later they were together, however, both declaring they had no quarrel. No legal proceedings had been contemplated, they insisted.

One month before the separation Mr. Colt, interviewed here, while his wife was in the Ohio hospital, denied any estrangement. He served as an army lieutenant overseas during the war and has been in various business ventures.

Countess Moroni is well known in and around Providence. She formerly lived at the Providence-Biltmore and with the Colt family at the Bristol place. It was said papers in her suit were filed May 1 and served on her

husband at his home in Milan, Italy, on May 22. Hearing in the case also probably will be during the week of July 2.

The Countess is a resident of Montreal. At present she is camping in Quebec. She is represented in her suit by Joseph E. Grimes and George C. Clinton, of this city, as counsel. Gardner, Moss & Haslam of this city, are attorneys for her husband. This law firm also is representing Miss Barrymore.

The first dinner dance of the season was held last night at the Riverside Golf and Country Club and was greatly enjoyed. The attendance was slightly lessened by the unfavorable weather conditions.
