

FOUND IN HOTEL WITH THROAT CUT; DIES IN HOSPITAL

A man who registered as David Mack, of Musquash, was found in a room in the Victoria Hotel about 10:30 o'clock last evening with an ugly wound in his throat and a razor lying by his side. Dr. D. C. Malcolm was called and had the man sent to the General Public Hospital where he died early this morning. Inquiry at Musquash last night elicited

the information that no man named David Mack lived there. An unusual noise issuing from the room which the man occupied attracted the attention of Hans O'Dell, a bell-boy at the hotel. He notified James Boyle, the porter, and the two employees, together with J. E. McAuley, of Lower Millstream, a guest at the hotel, investigated. A. M. Phillips, the manager, was notified and an entry to the room was finally effected and the gruesome discovery made. The man had been in his room only a few minutes before he was found.

As soon as Mack was found the police were notified and an effort was made to get a doctor. Some little delay was experienced in securing medical aid but Dr. Malcolm was finally located and came to the hotel. He said that the main artery had not been cut and that the man had a chance for life. Mack was taken in the ambulance to the hospital where he passed away at 2:30 o'clock this morning.
