ONE WAS FIRM AT TODAY'S OPENING

Some Oils Suffered Fractional Recessions—New High Record.

New York, June 26.—Spirited buying of various speculative favorites, including low-priced rail and specialty shares, the opening of today's market. Gains were general throughout the list, with the exception of a few of the oils, which suffered fractional recessions. Included in the new 1924 high records was Schlitz, which rose 1 1/2 points.

Montreal, June 26.—Canadian Industrial Alcohol continued to play a prominent part in activity during the first hour's trading on the Montreal Stock Exchange this morning. It came up unchanged at 31. The balance of the list was active and firm. Toronto Railroads registered an advance of 1/8 to 97 1/2. Canadian Car was up 1/4 to 46. Steamships preferred was up 1/4 to 48. Steamships common was up 1/4 to 48. Detroit Railway suffered an overnight recession of one point to 35.
