THE CHOLERA.

The Hospitals Densely Crowded Panama, July 28.—There are now 175 ersons in the hospitals suffering from ysentery. Doctors say over half their atients are ill with the same disease. It is a species of cholera and in many ases terminates fatally.

The Panama National Government as cancelled the order for quarantine,

AN ELECTRIC RAILROAD.

CLEVELAND, July 28.—The first commercially successful electric railroad in America was started in operation here yesterday by the East Cleveland Street Railroad Company, who have just com-pleted a mile of road and ran cars on it to-day for the first time. The experi-ment was so successful that the comment was so suppressing that the company expect to change their entire system, comprising over twenty miles, into electric roads. The current is carreid on under ground, conductors laid in conduits like those of cable roads. Cars are started, stopped and reversed with the greatest ease. 




