Full returns from Muskoka give Dill, Liberal, 127 majority.

In the Privy Council confirms the 'boundary award at the North as well as at the West, Ontario will be larger than any country in Europe excepting Russia and Austria. Ontario will have an area of 220,000 square miles as compared with the 208,000 of Germany, the 200,000 of France, Spain 136,031, Italy's 33,640, and England's 58,320.

It is a sad state of affairs, indeed, when party rancour has such an influence as to cause people to oppose the interests of their own country for political reasons.

Jealousy of Prussia was split up the German empire, and the different kingdoms were not forced together by outside pressure instead of being cemented by good-will. In the case of the Dominion the outside influences are all the other way. They are such as to attract the provinces to make other alliances. These influences are at work in the Maritime provinces and the northwestern provinces and should any mutually repellant influences which exist among the provinces be strengthened, the Dominion will not hold together.

WOMEN THAN WHISKY.
A Society Bitch's Downfall—A Victim of the Opioid Habit.

There is now pending in a court of equity in Baltimore a divorce suit which has brought to light particulars of a most revolting character, illustrating in a striking and distressing manner the blighting effects of the opium habit. Owing to the high social standing of the parties involved the greatest secrecy has been observed, and the names are withheld from publication. It is known however that the unfortunate victim of the deadly drug was, until her marriage in 1869, a noted society belle living on the Eastern Shore. She graduated with high honors in the Marietta College, and was afterwards married to a gentleman living in the same county of equal social rank and wealth. The wedding was a splendid affair, and she was one of the most prominent events of the Eastern Shore. For several years the married life of the couple was one of great happiness. Three children blessed the union. Soon after the birth of the last child it was observed that the wife became subject to fits of melancholy, at times taking no interest in anything around her, and again she was very cheerful. An old and trusted servant finally discovered that the wife was a confirmed opium eater.

Every effort was made by the distracted husband to break her of the habit, but without success. Two years ago she disappeared—still young and pretty—and though detective work was done, no trace of her could be found. Recently a policeman of Baltimore observed among the names of persons sent to the House of Correction that of the missing woman whom he had known in youth. Upon her discharge he traced her to one of the vilest dens in Baltimore kept by a colored woman. The officer notified the husband and a few days ago they went together to the place and the husband found his long lost wife—his beautiful bride of a few years—lying in the company of a coarse, brutal-looking negro. The wretched man sprang forward to destroy her, but was restrained by the policeman. All traces of the woman's former beauty had disappeared, and she was almost unrecognizable even to her husband. Evidence for the divorce suit was obtained from the opium victim left her fate. In conversation she seemed to be wholly depraved and did not manifest the slightest regret for what she had done. She was unmoved, even when allusion was made to her children, when she betrayed some little emotion.
