

Q.61 At the time you were picked up was it your definite intention to return to the Army in four or five days?

Q.62 At any time during the seventy days that you were absent did you intend to desert His Majesty's Service?

A.62 No, sir.

Q.63 It was, throughout that time, your intention to return?

A.63 Yes, sir.

A.64 No, sir.

Q.65 With reference to your conversation with Pte. Line in camp prior to your leaving camp, you said that you were angry. Is that right?

A.65 Yes, sir.

Q.66 At that time, when you left camp angry, you did intend to return?

A.66 We did intend to return, sir.

Q.67 Did Garneau, the bush camp foreman at Brule, see you in uniform?

A.67 Yes, sir.

Q.68 When you changed from uniform into civilian clothes what did you do with your uniform?

A.68 Tied it up in a sack, sir.

Q.69 You hid your uniform where?

A.69 In the bunkhouse, sir.

Q.70 Where in the bunkhouse?

A.70 Under the bed, sir.

Q.71 Is that a logical place to hide a sack with uniforms in it?

A.71 No, sir. I guess we should have kept them on and come back sooner.
