Opposition to Power Company.
St. Catharines, Aug. 4.—The bylaw granting a franchise to the Ontario Power Co. to pole the streets and distribute and sell electric energy throughout the city will not come into effect for a while. John S. Campbell, barrister, on behalf of a client, has written to the council protesting on account of grave irregularities in the vote, and threatening to ask for an injunction and investigation into the whole vote if the measure is finally passed. It is believed that the Ontario Power Co. is behind the opposition to the bylaw.

Want Reduced Rates.
Chicago, Aug. 4.—The filing of a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, asking that body to investigate the tariffs and net revenue of express companies, by commercial organizations throughout the country, was made known yesterday. The petition is signed by 124 associations of commerce and commercial clubs who want a considerable reduction in express rates.

The Reward of Bravery.
London, Aug. 4.—King George, at Marlborough House Tuesday, in the presence of the Home Secretary and other Government officials, decorated 62 miners for conspicuous gallantry in saving life at sea.

Two Hundred Fishermen Drowned.
St. Petersburg, Aug. 4.—Under the direction of the military authorities, rescue work was yesterday taken up on the River Amel Amoor, near Nicolaevsk, where 200 fishermen are known to have been drowned Tuesday. It is feared that the death list will exceed that number.

Explosion Result of Carelessness.
St. Petersburg, Aug. 4.—The Russian admiralty yesterday ordered a rigid investigation into the torpedo boat explosion at Kronstadt Tuesday, in which six sailors were killed and nearly a score injured. It is hinted that the explosion resulted from carelessness on the part of the crew.

A Reign of Terror.
Bonny, Fla., Aug. 4.—A reign of terror exists in the southwestern section of Holmes County, owing to the determination of the whites, by a wholesale lynching of negroes, to avenge the murder of Jesse Harrison, a 14-year-old white girl.

Appointed Science Master.
Kingston, Aug. 4.—S. J. Henry, M.A., a graduate of Queen's University, has been appointed assistant science master in Collegiate Institute.

Pugsley at Military College.
Kingston, Aug. 5.—Hon. Dr. Pugsley was here yesterday and promised new dormitories, a drill hall and a cement wharf at the Royal Military College, which he saw yesterday for the first time. Dr. Pugsley was delighted with Kingston. He said it had a magnificent location. He went on to Toronto on the Government steamer Speedy.

Lightning Struck Six.
Galt, Aug. 5.—The electric storm Wednesday night was the worst in years. The home of R. S. Dryden was struck, demolishing the interior of one bedroom and partially stunning six members of the household.

Mrs. Walter Jones, a resident of Moffat, who disappeared a week ago, is supposed to be in Toronto, where a search will be made.

Booth is Generous.
Ottawa, Aug. 5.—J. R. Booth, the lumberman whose mills had to be closed down owing to the strike, has paid the men \$12,000 for the time they were out of work.

They had a meeting yesterday and publicly expressed appreciation of their employer's generous act.
