# BURNED TO DEATH

FOUR PERSONS

Fatal Results of Tenement Fire in Brooklyn Yesterday-Others

Have Close Call

NEW YORK, March 10.—Four per-ons were burned to death in Brooklyn oday, three in a tenement fire on Bushwick avenue and another woman Bushwick avenue and another woman in her home. One man was probably fatally injured in the tenement fire.

It is supposed that the tenement house fire started in the cellar. It was discovered by a tenant on the way to the cellar for coal. Within two minutes it reached the air shaft. By the time most of the tenants on the upper floor were warned the blaze had reached the stairs and their escape was cut off. The families who lived in the rear of the tenement easily made their escape, Those living in the front part could not reach the fire escape and ran to the windows calling for help. When the firemen arrived there were more than thirty persons crowded in the front windows. Ladders were raised and firemen carried all to the street with the exception of Mrs. Bingalli and her two children and Banattro.

She had reached the fifth floor and apparently made ineffectual efforts to raise the skylight, when she was overcome by the smoke. Banattro was injured in Jumping from the building.
