### VALUABLE PAPERS IN THE STOLEN MAIL BAG

W. C. Whittaker Has Been Conducting an Investigation at Tracadie

William D. Whittaker, assistant post-office inspector, has been at Tracadie during the last few days, making an investigation in regard to the mail-bag which was stolen from the sleigh of the mail carrier between Tracadie and Carleton Place, on March 30th. The driver, named Le Breton, was employed only temporarily by the regular carrier Thomas Berry. Le Breton stopped at a house to play cards, leaving his mail-bags on the sleigh. When he returned one of the bags had been stolen from the sleigh. The bag has since been recovered. It had been cut open and its contents stolen including registered letters. The money in these registered letters would not be more than \$50, which was divided into several small amounts. The most important feature of the theft was that one registered letter contained some very valuable papers. To whom these papers belonged or what their nature is not stated. It is understood that a warrant has been issued and that the suspected parties are already under surveillance but further details will not be known until Mr. Whittaker reaches the city.

### LONGSHOREMEN HAVE BEEN VERY GENEROUS

Their Assistance Has Been Most Valuable in Dealing With Distress This Winter.

During the winter now ending, a large number of people who never previously have been in want have been compelled to rely to some extent on the kindness of friends. Among those who have been a number of members of the Longshoremen's Association, men who in ordinary seasons have been able to earn good wages and support comfortably their wives and families. The demands on all charitable organizations have been very heavy and every source has been drawn upon this year to meet the requirements. It is with great pleasure that the Board of Associated Charities has received most generous aid from the Longshoremen's Association. This body has responded nobly to the call—perhaps even to a greater degree than could have been expected. Different cases have arisen in which members of the Association being unable to obtain relief have required immediate relief. On application to the Association it has been shown that there is no fund available for this, but the members have in numerous cases privately come to the assistance of their companions. Men have repeatedly volunteered to give up one of their own days in the week or one of their nights in order that the unemployed might have a chance to earn. One man in particular who had absolutely nothing to depend upon was in this way provided with the means to work each week and managed to earn \$9.00 a week during the greater part of the season. This was a most valuable contribution from number of his companions. Although no account has been kept of the cash given, it is known that at least \$900 has been distributed by the Association to unemployed men or their families and this has very materially aided in the relief work in the city. Apparently the laboring man is always ready to share his last dollar with anyone less fortunate than himself.
