Anxiety Felt for the Safety of Twenty Men Who Went to Rescue of Ill-fated Ves-

Ottawa, May 30.—The claims of the Farmers' Bank victims are again being pressed upon the government, and the general concensus of opinion among members on both sides of the house seems to be that some measure of relief ought to be forthcoming.

There is no official information available as to what will be done, or as to the extent of the aid which may be granted.

The losses amount to approximately a million and a quarter, and it is expected that the double liability, of which not much more than forty per cent, is likely to be collected will take care of the preferred claims only.
