# TEUTONIC FORCES KNOCKING AT GATES OF RIGA

## GENERAL KORNILOFF'S COMBINED TO COMBAT RED ANARCHY IN RUSSIAN ARMY

Situation on Whole Front Is Bad, Declares Commander in Chief—Enemy Endeavoring to Destroy Roumanian Army and Is Now Knocking at Gates of Riga.

Moscow, Aug. 28.—In the conference here on Monday Premier Kerevsky introduced Gen. Korniloff, saying the government had thought it necessary to invite the commander-in-chief to lay before the conference the situation at the front and in the army.

General Korniloff said the death penalty, restoration of which he had asked together with other measures, constituted only a small part of what was necessary in an army stricken with the terrible evils of disorganization and insubordination. In the present month, Gen. Korniloff said, soldiers had killed four regimental commanders and other officers, and ceased these outrages only when they were threatened with being shot. Quite recently one of the regiments of Siberian Rifles, which had fought so splendidly at the beginning of the revolution, abandoned its positions on the Riga front. Nothing except an order to exterminate the entire regiment availed to cause it to return to its positions.

General Korniloff then outlined the most important of these measures, in addition to restoration of the death penalty, which are:

First: Restoration of discipline in the army by the strengthening of the authority of officers and non-commissioned officers.

Second: Improvement of the financial positions of officers, who have been in a very difficult position in the recent military operations.

Third: Restriction of the functions of regimental committees, which, although managing economic affairs of the regiments, must not be permitted to have any part in decisions regarding military operations or the appointment of leaders.

## WEIRD TALE OF YEAR OLD TRAGEDY TOLD BY YOUTH

Twelve Year Old Boy of Upper Sackville Claims That Sergeant Was Shot and Killed by Deserter and Body Buried in Clump of Woods by Moonlight—Lad in Jail.

The boy adds that he and Sears were thoroughly alarmed at what had been done and that when he visited the boy stack Sears persuaded him to assist in burying the body. McPhie maintains that the body was buried in a clump of woods nearby.

The lad was urged to tell nobody of the tragedy. Recently he told acquaintances of the alleged murder, but the story eventually reaching the ears of the authorities at Amherst. They came to Middle Sackville yesterday with the sheriff and a number of other officials and interviewed the boy who confirmed the story which they had heard.

When McPhie was asked where the body was buried the lad said that it had been buried in a clump of bushes but he was unable to locate the spot. Nothing was done towards digging up the ground in the vicinity but the youth was placed under arrest and taken to Dorchester for examination. Young McPhie still sticks to his word story.

There is no other evidence to lead the authorities or the residents of the county to believe that a murder was committed.

Sears Arrested.  
Moncton, Aug. 28.—A sensational story of alleged murder comes from the parish of Backville, but so far it is very vague and lacking of confirmation. A prosperous young farmer named Sears, 26-A. Abougan Road, is alleged to have been charged with deserting from the 14th Battalion and his name is conspicuously connected with the startling story told by a fifteen year old boy. The story of the boy in substance follows:

The alleged deserter, Sears, while a member of the 14th, returned to his home from Valcartier the latter part of the summer of 1916, on leave, but did not return. Military escort was sent a number of times to round him up and some others in that locality, but Sears was not apprehended. The story of the boy is that a member of the military police whose name is not yet disclosed by the authorities, visited the locality to arrest the accused. He encountered the deserter in company with another man, and the two men and the boy says the deserter shot him, the body being buried by the deserter and boy.

Yesterday Deputy Sheriff Holland of Dorchester, in company with others, went to the locality where it was alleged the body was buried, but were unable to locate the body or find any story which would suggest that a body had been buried there.

This morning Sears was arrested charged with being a deserter from the 14th Battalion, and was taken to the county jail at Dorchester. Whether he will be charged with a serious offence based on the boy's story, depends upon the result of the investigation now being made by the Crown authorities. The boy has also been placed under arrest and is being held as a witness in the event of developments tending to support his sensational confession.

Sears comes of a highly respectable family and has always borne a good reputation. The community is inclined to doubt the story of the boy. The military policeman alleged to be the victim of foul play is believed to come from Sussex.

Built Hut.  
A further account says that Sears deserted about two months before the regiment sailed. He retired to his farm but was afraid to live at home on account of the M.P.s. He therefore built himself a hut over which he erected a hay stack, the whole having the appearance of a stack only. In this haystack he lived at night or whenever danger of arrest threatened. The boy, who was reared by the accused, was employed to bring food to his retreat. A soldier sentries to obtain a reward, came to the farm looking for the deserter. He was armed with a revolver and bayonet. He had been tipped off to search the stack, and was doing so by walking around it, sticking his bayonet into the stack. They saw the dead man's putties and saw them for slings with which to carry the body, accused carrying the corpse on his shoulders and the boy carrying the foot.

Through Wire Fence.

The accused, the boy alleges, then took twenty dollars in cash and a revolver and bayonet off the deceased.
