

SCHOOL BOARD CONCERNED WITH SALARIES OF TEACHERS

Male Teachers Not Satisfied With Treatment Accorded Their Request for Increased Stipend—Sick Leave Allowance Causes Considerable Argument—Felt Favorites Had Been Played in Some Cases—Target Range for Cadets.

A meeting of the St. John School Board was held in the Board of Trustees building, Hazen avenue, last evening. In the absence of the chairman, Dr. A. F. Emery, Trustee Michael O'Connell presided. Those present were Dr. H. S. Bridges, E. R. W. Ingraham, G. E. Day, M. Coll, H. G. Green, Mrs. Richard O'Brien, J. P. D. Lewis and H. C. Smith.

The payment to be granted teachers on sick leave, what recognition should be given the Teachers' Association by the board, and the hearing of the Centennial school, came in for considerable discussion during the meeting. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Secretary A. Gordon Leavitt. Before their adoption Mr. Day asked if any teacher in the employ of the board was receiving less than the minimum amount, \$700, determined at the last meeting. He was answered in the negative.

Mr. Lewin thought the increase voted the carpenters and janitors was a very generous one. The minutes were then adopted as read. A communication was read from Miss Bertha A. Britain asking for five months' leave of absence advised by her physician. It was moved that Miss Britain be granted the five months' leave with full pay.

from the association of the schedule of salaries they had adopted. Mr. Lewin wanted to know if the association represented a collective bargaining organization, and what recognition the board was prepared to give the association. The secretary was authorized to inform the association on the action taken by the board. An offer was submitted by James Mortimer Robinson of land on the West Side suitable for a school building. A request was read from the Vocational School Board asking for the use of a large room in the rear of the trustees building to be used by the electrical class. The matter was referred to the building committee with power to act.

The secretary, A. Gordon Leavitt, submitted his report for February: The number of teaching days was 20; pupils enrolled, 8,163, boys 3,992, girls 4,166; average daily attendance 6,667; during the month one pupil died; 137 were sick; 15 went to work; 17 left the city; 147 were kept at home. A number of teachers were absent through illness during the week for varying lengths of time.

In regard to a property desired by the board for school purposes, it was moved that the committee having the matter already in hand be authorized to appoint an arbitrator to act with two others in determining a price to be set on the property, and the price be then submitted to the board. A motion was made that a range and targets be secured for the King George school.

Mr. Day said he had had a motion passed granting a teacher half pay during an absence of four months through illness; he was not at the time aware that full pay had been granted others under similar circumstances and he therefore moved that her request for the difference be further considered. Mr. Lewin was of the opinion that once the board had settled on a motion it should stand by its decision, and as a matter of principle opposed any such step.

SECOND READING OF IRISH BILL TO COME VERY SOON

Essential That Gov't Position Should be Made Plain Before Easter, Says Andrew Bonar Law.

London, March 8.—The Government has decided that it is absolutely necessary to have a second reading discussion of the Irish Home Rule Bill, before the Easter recess, Andrew Bonar Law, announced in the House of Commons today. It was essential, he added, in view of the situation in Ireland that it should be made plain that, so far as the Government was concerned, they meant to continue with the bill, which was the most important measure of the session.

The Premier was asked in the Commons whether in drifting the final Peace terms the Supreme Council would take steps to prevent "the further misuse" as a mosque of the Church of St. Sophia, at Constantinople and restore it to the use for which it was built as one of the great shrines of Christendom. Mr. Lloyd George replied that the Allies, as at present advised, do not contemplate any change in this matter.

WINNIPEG MAJOR MURDERED BY THE BOLSHEVIK

Major Mills With Three British Officers Shot Last December, According to War Office Report.

Winnipeg, March 8.—News of the murder of Major Edgar Ronald Mills of Winnipeg, by Bolsheviki in Siberia, was received in the city today by his family. Major Mills and three other British officers were shot by the Bolsheviki near Tselgia, Siberia, about December 22, 1919, according to a message from the War Office. Major Mills left Winnipeg in 1917, to take part in the expedition to the North Pole. After service in France until the armistice, he volunteered for service in Russia. The last letter received by his family from him was mailed from Ishim last October.

CATHOLIC EDITOR ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Alleged to Have Been the Cause of Inciting Attack on Lord French.

London, March 8.—The trial of Charles Diamond, editor of the Catholic Herald, charged with inciting the murder of Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and others by an article in his paper, began at the Old Bailey court today. The trial is an outgrowth of the attempt to assassinate Viscount French on December 19 last. Diamond pleaded not guilty, declaring the charge a "notorious lie."

PRESBYTERIANS NEARING MARK

Toronto, Ont., March 8.—A new objective of \$5,000,000 set by the Presbyterian Forward Movement, is in a fair way of being reached. Up to noon today reports received, showed that \$4,500,000 have already been subscribed, with a number of scattered congregations to make returns. These are chiefly in the Western Provinces.

Sir Thomas White, in Brilliant Speech, Vigorously Defends Union Government's Policy

(Continued from page 1) series of coalition Governments, with the clash and conflict and the intrigues of antagonistic groups. It would strike a deadly blow at Governmental stability, and it would bring about chaos in the administration of the country's affairs.

What the country needed was a maintenance of the responsibility of the two great traditional parties. "Let the public mind steady down," he declared, "and then, if Sir Robert Borden forms a national Liberal-Conservative party from among his present followers who think alike with him on political, fiscal and economic questions, it is my judgment that he will sweep the country." This declaration, received with enthusiastic approval, cheered, told more plainly than anything else possibly could tell that Sir Thomas had touched a responsive chord among the rank and file of Unionists.

Sir Thomas defended the National Policy upon the ground that it was not for a section or a class, but in the interests of the nation as a whole. "The National Policy," he said, "is not a question of tariff schedules. It is a vital principle for Canada. It was the policy which had prevailed in 1871, which had been confirmed in 1891, which had been adopted by the Liberal party in 1896, and which, more than anything else in the country's history, had gone to the building of national prosperity.

Turning to the Agrarian group, Sir Thomas sharply assailed the attitude of Mr. Crerar. The Farmers' leader had two policies for the platform and Parliament. In his speeches throughout the country he had preached extreme tariff hostility, but in the Commons, where he was likely to be held to more strict accountability for his words, he had preached moderation. Towards the class, Sir Thomas made a vigorous and telling reply to Dr. Clark's criticism of his financial administration. "The financial position of Canada," he declared, "challenged the unqualified admiration of both England and the United States." His policy throughout had had two objects: (1) encouragement of production to give the country a potential independence of all classes in a position to meet after-war depression. He had been attacked for borrowing in New York, yet what had been the record of Britain in the same regard?—the Britain from which Dr. Clark took all his lessons in political wisdom. During the war Britain had shipped through Canada the colossal value of \$1,300,000,000, had disposed of \$5,000,000,000 worth of securities in New York, and in 1918 had spent one billion dollars in propping up its New York exchange.

DEMONSTRATION AT COPENHAGEN

Reunion of Flensburg With Denmark Gloriously Celebrated—King Addresses Throng.

Copenhagen, March 8.—A great demonstration in favor of the reunion of Flensburg, Schleswig, with Denmark occurred here yesterday. Fifty thousand persons, headed by war veterans, marched in procession to the Royal Palace where they were addressed from a balcony by King Christian. The King assured the people that he shared fully the feelings which brought them there.

NEW YORK RECEIVES CANADIAN GOLD

New York, March 8.—There was received today \$3,000,000 in gold from Canada. This shipment completed the remittance of \$6,000,000 made by the Canadian Government, \$3,000,000 having been received last week. It was announced today that \$1,250,000 South African gold had been shipped from London to a firm in New York. Washington, March 8.—Unless provision is made to maintain the efficiency of the present naval reserve forces by systematic training, the United States navy within a few years, will be faced with the same lack of potential man-power as when the country entered the war, Secretary Daniels today told the House Naval Affairs Committee.
