

PROVINCIAL RIFLE MEET CONCLUDES

Trophies Presented to the Successful Marksmen—Average Scores Were Higher Than Last Year—Winners of Grand Aggregate, Prince of Wales, Donville, and McAvity Matches.

Sussex, N. B., Aug. 15.—The tents are struck and the range is again in quietness and the members of the New Brunswick Provincial Rifle Association who have been here all week taking part in the annual meet have returned to their homes, well satisfied with the results of the competition.

The week was an exceptionally fine one and the shooting conditions all that could be desired, except on the first afternoon, when a number of heavy showers made things disagreeable for a time.

Some difficulty was experienced with the new sharp pointed ammunition at first, but after the men had become used to it and learned how to regulate their rifles to meet with the slight drift to the right which it had over the other some excellent and in fact record shooting was done.

The program was brought to a close this afternoon with the presentation of the trophies, which took place on the lawn in front of the bungalow.

The Prince of Wales cup was presented to Sgt. R. P. Clark, of the 67th regiment, by Major J. S. Knox, and the presentation of the Ladies' cup was made to Sgt. S. L. Day by Mrs. J. S. Frost, of St. John.

The presentation of the trophy for the county match to the Westmorland-Kent team was made by Major J. S. Knox and the McAvity cup was presented by J. S. Knox, of Sussex, by Capt. J. Manning, R. C.

The grand aggregate medals were presented to the winners by Major J. M. Kinneer, who had the distinction of presenting the first gold medal and first money prize to his son, Major G. S. Kinneer. The Donville cup was also presented by Major J. S. Frost to the winner, Gr. W. H. Campbell, of the Association trophy, which was won by Sgt. H. M. Smith with the high score of 101, was presented by H. A. Chandler, of the association executive, one of the following is the result of the matches shot this afternoon as well as the Robertson trophy, the championships are arrived at by the addition of the grand aggregate to the scores made in the Donville and Governor-General's matches. This year's total was this year with 448 points, which is seventeen points better than the score made by the winner last year.

THE PROVINCIAL COURTS. To the Editor of The Telegraph: "Sir,—The constitution of our provincial courts and the personnel of the judges who preside over them are subjects of importance not only to the legal profession and litigants but also to the general public. The proposed changes in the organization of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick and the new appointments which have been suggested to fill the vacancies on the bench, which legislation and possible resignations will ensue, are thus of more than ordinary interest.

Near the closing hours of the last session of the legislature, without any suggestion from the legal profession, the as far as is known without any necessity or call for the change, a bill was introduced, and without debate, passed through the house, providing for a Court of Appeal consisting of three judges, of whom the Chief Justice of New Brunswick shall be one, and who shall also constitute the Chancery Division of the Court and shall reside in this city, and a King's Bench Division of four judges (thus necessitating the appointment of another judge) who shall reside in St. John and one in Fredericton. WHY DOES HE NOT DO IT?

(Acadian Recorder). Shortly after his return from England last year, Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden was given a great banquet at Montreal on September 21, to celebrate the first anniversary of his election as head of a Conservative government. It was made an unusually important event. There were 600 guests, with delegations representing every province of the Dominion, practically the whole centre of the Conservative party being present—the Nationalist wing not being represented as that alliance had not then become predominant. In view of this, Mr. Borden followed the English custom of making important announcements at such semi-state affairs. The Prime Minister gave a guarded account of what had taken place during his visit to England, and what he intended to do. Quoting a statement made while leader of the opposition, so as to reaffirm it as Prime Minister, Mr. Borden said:

"I said it would be our plain duty, that the government of this country could ascertain, if they took proper action for that purpose, to find whether the naval issues were grave. That if we were in power we would find this out and get an unvarnished answer, and that if the answer to that question by the government of the Mother Country and the reports of the Admiralty experts were such as to demand immediate action, then we would appeal to Parliament for immediate effective aid, AND IF PARLIAMENT DID NOT GIVE THAT I WOULD APPEAL FROM PARLIAMENT TO THE PEOPLE OF CANADA." This statement was received with tremendous cheering by the 600 leading Conservative guests.

Mr. Borden proceeded to say that he regarded the position as so grave that although he had not wished to call parliament before January, 1913, he had decided to call it early in November, and proceeded, "I INTEND SIMPLY TO PLACE OUR CASE BEFORE PARLIAMENT AND THE PEOPLE OF CANADA."

The Senate merely took him at his word and asked that the people be appealed to in order to settle the matter before dispute. Why does not Mr. Borden make that appeal, for which he professed to be so ready? Is his refusal cowardice or cunning politics, which?
