

- Q.99 How long?
- A.99 Three or four months.
- Q.100 From that time on you worked permanently on that job?
- A.100 Yes, Sir.
- Q.101 Did you wear your uniform when you were hauling coal?
- A.101 No, Sir.
- Q.102 Did you wear your uniform at all?
- A.102 Yes, Sir.
- Q.103 The first month?
- A.103 Yes, Sir.
- Q.104 After the fourth month did you wear it?
- A.104 At times I had my uniform on.
- Q.105 On what occasion?
- A.105 Oh! in the house at times I was at my mothers.
- Q.106 Did you have your uniform on after you were home after four or five months?
- A.106 At my mothers - when I went over to my mothers.
- Q.107 How far is that?
- A.107 It is about the length of a block, Sir.
- Q.108 Would that be about your extent of appearance in uniform?
- A.108 I didn't go very far, Sir, my wife was sick and I was staying right around with her.
- Q.109 So from 1941 or the early part of 1942 you have made no effort whatever to contact the Airforce and inform the army of your position?
- A.109 I made contact with the Airforce, Sir, I went down to see them and each time I was down they told me to wait until I was called.
- Q.110 And you had been in the army since March of 1941?
- A.110 Yes, Sir.
