three more voyages, but till the day of his death, in 1506, he thought that he had only found a new way to India, and had no idea that he had discovered a new continent.

Other navigators now turned towards the west. In 1497, the year before Columbus first visited the mainland of America,

John Cabot, a Venetian, who had settled at Bristol, explored some part of the coast of North America. Upon this England afterwards grounded a claim to a large part of the continent. Cabot received high honours at court for his services, and the next vear sailed again to make further explorations. With him on both vovages went his son Sebastian, who afterwards sailed far north in a vain search for a north-west passage to India.
