DAIRY PRODUCE.

During the past week the tendency in the butter market has been to slightly higher levels. The production of butter in Canada this year promises to be considerably behind the production of last year, and this fact is enough to strengthen the market. Total receipts at Montreal to date this season are 115,700 pounds behind needed stock for corresponding period a year ago. Creamery prints are here needed 42c to 43c, and solids 41c to 42-1-2c at country points; dairy prints, 35c to 42c. Montreal dealers are paying for finest creamery 41-1-2c; fine, 41-1-2c to 42c; finest dairy, 37c to 41-1-2c; fine dairy, 37c, lower grades, 35-1-2c to 36c.

There is nothing new to report in the cheese market except for the steadily decreasing receipts as compared with the same period last year. Prices at country boards follow:

Brookville, Ont., Sept. 27.—White, 3,016; 1,275; all sold at 21-1-2c, except 240 boxes at 21-3-4c.

Kingston, Sept. 27.—340 colored and 80 white boxed; 240 sold at 21-1-2c.

Lafayette, Ont., Sept. 28.—1,613 cheese sold on street at 21-1-2c.

Napanee, Sept. 28.—340 white and 290 colored, 345 selling at 21-1-2c and 250 at 21-1-2c.

Cornwall, Sept. 28.—3,015 white and 255 colored, 357 selling at 21-1-2c and the rest at 21-1-2c. At this time last year, 1,941 sold at 21c.

Picton, Sept. 28.—3,501 sold at 21-1-2c.

Pexeth, Sept. 28.—1,100 sold at 21-1-2c.

Trochu, Sept. 28.—735 boxes sold at 21-1-2c.

LIVE STOCK.

Live stock receipts for the week dropped several thousands from last week's totals in both cattle and sheep, but notwithstanding this fact there was a liberal and normal supply on sale for this season of the year. The movement of cattle continued to abate, as was confined to about five hundred head, the remainder being sold on the open market. The quality of the stock offered was on the whole inferior, the exception being a few heads of good weighty calves on the Monday market, with a few more loads sprinkled through the receipts. For the balance of the week, with 2,800 cattle on sale on Monday, trading might be classed as steady, with commission houses asking 7-1/2c per head and slightly better prices did prevail mostly in the market for good quality cattle, but these were paid in a few instances only, and in common butcher cattle trading was slow. On Tuesday, the market was slow and drab, but a fairly active trade prevailed on Wednesday and Thursday. Cattle moving out on the later dates at steady prices for medium grade, and a few heads higher for choice quality butcher cattle. Hogs advanced 25 cents on Monday to 11-1/2c for select, fed and watered, and made similar advances on Tuesday and Wednesday, the market being firm and active at this new level on Thursday with commission houses endeavoring to realize 11-1/2c. However, the bulk was sold up at 11-1/2c.

CANADIAN HOLSTEINS IN NEW ZEALAND.

M. H. C. BURNARD, of Cambridge, New Zealand, in writing for the Canadian Year Book, says:—"I am a keenly interested Canadian in the Canadian blood in my herd of your very best strains. For instance, I am using two herd sires by Prince Hengerveld. The one is out of Prince's cow, Lady Woodcrest. The other, Herd Kot of Burnard of a great show bull and has won 23 championships, 20 of which he obtained in succession. I am using, and among my cows I have a few by Mrs. E. E. Burnard."
"The new bull that I have now coming forward to mate with the property of my cattle is a New Zealand bred bull whose four nearest dams average 15.61 pounds milk and 726 pounds of fat. Our conditions of semi-official tests are the same as yours and are conducted by the Government. I have 35 cows that have yearlings by semi-official records and they have beaten their standard by an average of 750 pounds of milk. I have only recently worked my farm up to make good enough to put every bull to the test, expect to improve all the time. We have no short-period testing in this Dominion."
