His Excellency's fpeech.

- " Gentlemen of the Council,
 - " And Gentlemen of the Assembly,
- " IN dismissing you, at this time, from your attend" ance in General Assembly, I take the opportunity
 " to express my satisfaction in the result of your deliberati" ons.
- "Though a perfect unanimity on every subject cannot be expected, yet a perfect harmony of counsels will eventually prevail so long as the several branches of the Legislature
- " continue to have a direct and fleady view to the public good.
- "But however wisely the laws may be adapted to that im"portant end, their falutary influence must, in a great mea-
- "fure, depend on the degree of respect and veneration in
- "which they are held by the community at large. You will
- " therefore at all times confider it as a duty you owe to your-
- " felves and to your country, to be vigilant in promoting a due
- " fense of the inviolable authority of the laws, and of the va-
- " lue of that excellent constitution which is so deservedly the
- " boasted birthright of British subjects."
