BY-LAW No. of the Corporation of the Township of Brantford.

WHEREAS, it is expedient and necessary to stop up a certain portion of the highway in the Village of Cainsville, in the Township of Brantford, which extends southward and southeastward from the Brantford and Hamilton Stone Road to the Onondaga Road and which portion of said highway is hereinafter more particularly described, and to provide for the sealing of the same;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Corporation of the Township of Brantford, in Council assembled, as follows:

1. That all that portion of the public highway in the Village of Cainsville, according to registered Survey No. 29, described as follows: Being composed of that part of the public highway which adjoins Lot Twenty-one in the said Survey on the West side thereof and Lots Twenty-nine and Thirty in said survey on the Northern side thereof and which is forty feet in width and extends Southerly and South-easterly from the southern boundary of the Brantford and Hamilton Stone Road to a straight line drawn from the North-east corner of the said Lot Thirty on a bearing of North sixteen degrees and thirty minutes East, and to which is hereby stopped up as a public highway in the said Township of Brantford.

2. The portion of said highway closed and stopped up as aforesaid shall be conveyed to the owners of the lands adjoining the same, the owners of the said lands being entitled to the portion of said highway opposite their respective lands to the centre line of said highway, and the Clerk of the Township is hereby authorized to execute to the respective owners as above mentioned.

This By-law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof.
