NOTES ON THE WEST

Mr Walter Smith has just returned
from a trip over prairie land. He
travelled through many leading, rapidly
developing towns.He left on the 25th of July. The
first corn he ate this season was in
Moose Jaw at the home of Mr Massey,
M. A., planted and cultivated by him-
self in his own garden."On my progress," he says,
"Through Manitoba, Saskatchewan,
and Alberta, I was surprised to see on
the markets of those provinces, cab-
bage, cucumbers, and garden produc-
tions so far in advance of all such pro-
duce in Ontario. I never saw pota-
toes so large. I was surprised at the
rapid growth of all garden products,
leaving our own gardens far behind."He seems reluctant to relieve his
memory of these matters, even now;
he seems more surprised when he re-
flects that not far below the surface on
which the plants grew, may be found
solid, frozen earth.From Qu'Appelle Mr Smith drove out
to an Indian Mission School, four
miles on Government road, including
320 Indian boys and girls. Around
the school are beautiful flower gardens
cultivated by the scholars under the
direction of skillful gardeners. When
one looks at the variety of these gor-
geous, vigorous, great sized flowers, one
is impressed with the fascination of
their marvellous beauty. They leave
the suburban and city flower gardens
of New York, which Mr Smith has
seen, far, far behind.All towns great and small, seems
ultimately determined to border their
limits with flower gardens and parks.
Some farmers have 2,000 to 3,000
bushels of grain: such may have many
piles of straw as large as small barns.From a little elevation one may
sometimes count twenty or more en-
gines at work, some so far away that
the smoke only may be seen. Then,
as evening comes on, they set fire to
the straw to get rid of it. Mr Smith
says it is a beautiful, a wild, a weird
sight to see 100 of these cones of flame
rise over a vast, broad plain, like
youthful volcanoes.He thinks it is an immense realm of
wealth, power and wonder, and re-
turned to his home highly pleased.Mr Irwin Wiltse reviewed the same
route.

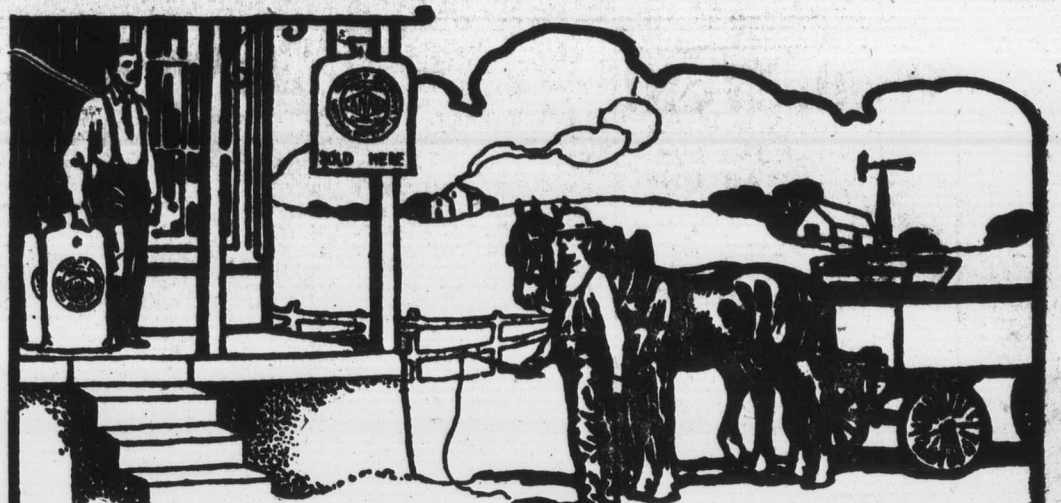
