A LAKE OF SODAIt Has Dammed Itself up in Far-
off ArizonaAnd the Wall is Composed of Pure
Soda—A Freak of Nature.

Probably few people ever heard of a soda
dam, but such a freak of nature really
exists in an unexplored part of the great
west. A. O. Wright, of the Indian ser-
vice, in speaking of strange things he has
encountered in his tours alluded to this
soda dam. Asked what he meant by a soda
dam, he said:
"In Box canyon, just above the hot
springs of the Jemez river, Arizona, is a
dam extending from one wall of the gorge
to the other. This dam is nothing more or
less than a massive wall of pure soda, rising
to the height of 100 feet, and probably 600
feet from end to end. Nature's forces, of
course, started their work of construction
away back in the dim and distant past,
when deposits of soda contained in the
water thrown off by the springs were made
a base of what has since developed into one
of the natural wonders of the west. Those
deposits must have been made with remark-
able rapidity.

Just 10 years ago the Jemez river rose
to an unprecedented height, and under the
abnormal pressure of the torrent a lower
section of the dam gave way, leaving a
breach in the wall of soda about 20 feet
wide. When the water subsided, the lake
formed by the dam was, of course, destruc-
ed, leaving the upper 80 feet of the dam
high and dry.

"I passed through that section of Arizona
this last summer, and purposely visited the
soda dam. I was most astonished to see
that the 20-foot breach had been nearly fill-
ed in. The soda from springs had made
fresh deposits, and gradually patched up
the hole made in 1890. At the present rate
the breach will be entirely closed in another
year and the lake will assume its former
proportions.

"Previous to the break in the dam, the
lake above was fully 600 feet wide, and ex-
tended up the canyon for at least three
quarters of a mile. Scientists who have
examined the dam are of the opinion that
it will never attain a height much above
100 feet, for the deposits in the water seem
to sink in that great depth before the
beak is reached. As they fall, however,
they will tend to strengthen the base of the
dam, and will gradually decrease the depth
of the lake at the lower end."

HIS HORSE FELL.Lord Roberts Thrown and Se-
verely Shaken up.The Accident Happened Sunday—De-
clared to be Suffering no Ill Effects.

London, November 22.—The Evening
Standard, in a special edition last
evening, said:—"Just as we are going
to press the news has reached London
that Lord Roberts was thrown from his
horse and received severe injuries."
The officials of the war office say
they are "not in a position to report
anything in connection with the
rumored accident to Lord Roberts."
This utterance is interpreted here as
giving indirect support to the Even-
ing Standard's statement.

Later—Lord Roberts' accident oc-
curred on Sunday last while he was
riding. His horse fell with him and
he was shaken and bruised, but his
limbs were broken. As he has since
sent despatches to the war office,
he is still performing his usual du-
ties, especially as he has not men-
tioned the accident.

A despatch to the Standard says:—"Lord Roberts' guard removed him to
Government House, at Johannesburg. He
was badly shaken and bruised, but it
is expected he will be able to
take the field again in the course of
a few days." The Daily Telegraph
learns that Lord Roberts has been
graphed privately to the Secretary of
State for War, Mr. William S. John-
son, that he felt no ill-effects
whatever.

GIRL'S PHANTOM.It Recalls a Dover Tragedy of
Many Years Ago.Poor Mary Jacobs and her Mysterious
Death—Was it Suicide or Murder?

Ref. Mr. Knight, Methodist pastor
of the Providence church during 1899
and 1900, had occasion every Sunday
to travel between Jacksonville, Creek
and Providence, Church, to preach.
Last winter, it is said he stated at a
church social at Gilbert H. Dolson's
that he had repeatedly seen an ap-
pearance of a young lady walking on
waters of the Thames in the vicinity
of the Jacobs farm, seven miles down
the river. He always saw the phan-
tom at night on his return trip, and
said it wore a Queen Anne collar,
which was identical with the collars
worn in these parts 40 years ago.

Mrs. Robert Williams, Raleigh,
who is still alive, resides on the
old Drake homestead, is cognizant of
facts which throw some light on the
mystery. Mrs. Williams is now 80
years old and she was born and raised
opposite the Jacobs farm.

In the early sixties, the family of
John Jacobs lived seven miles down
the river in Dover on the farm now
known as the old Jacobs homestead.
They were amongst the early settlers
and were much thought of in the
township. There were three sons,
Albert, George and John, and three
daughters, Bella, Annie and Mary.
It is the last named who furnishes the
details of this story. A man named
Alex. Miller was courting Mary, and
one day the young couple were sitting
on the bank of the river talking. The
Jacobs girls were very handsome.
Mrs. Jacobs, who had Indian blood in
her veins, disliked Miller, and ordered
the girl to leave him and go into the
house. The next day Mary was miss-
ing. A search was made for her in
the river, but no trace of the lost
girl was found. The mysterious dis-
appearance became named around the
neighborhood and William A. Crow,
a constable, made a search for the
lost maiden. He reported to Thomas
Williams, a Raleigh Justice of the
Peace, that there were blue flies
around one of the stables on the Ja-
cobs farm, and that the flies were
coming from the body of a young woman.
Constable Crow ordered to break the
stable open. When Mr. Crow went
next morning, he discovered the body
from the stable to the river, and the
body had been dragged to the water.
On investigating he found the corpse
of Mary Jacobs floating in the river
with the head all crushed in and the
body badly bruised about the should-
ers. An inquest was held by P. P.
Lacour. The coroner thought the
bruises and contusions on the body
had been caused by the driftwood in
the river. Thomas Williams, the jus-
tice of peace who was present, said it
was impossible to bruise dead flesh.
But, nevertheless, the jury brought in
a verdict of self-destruction.

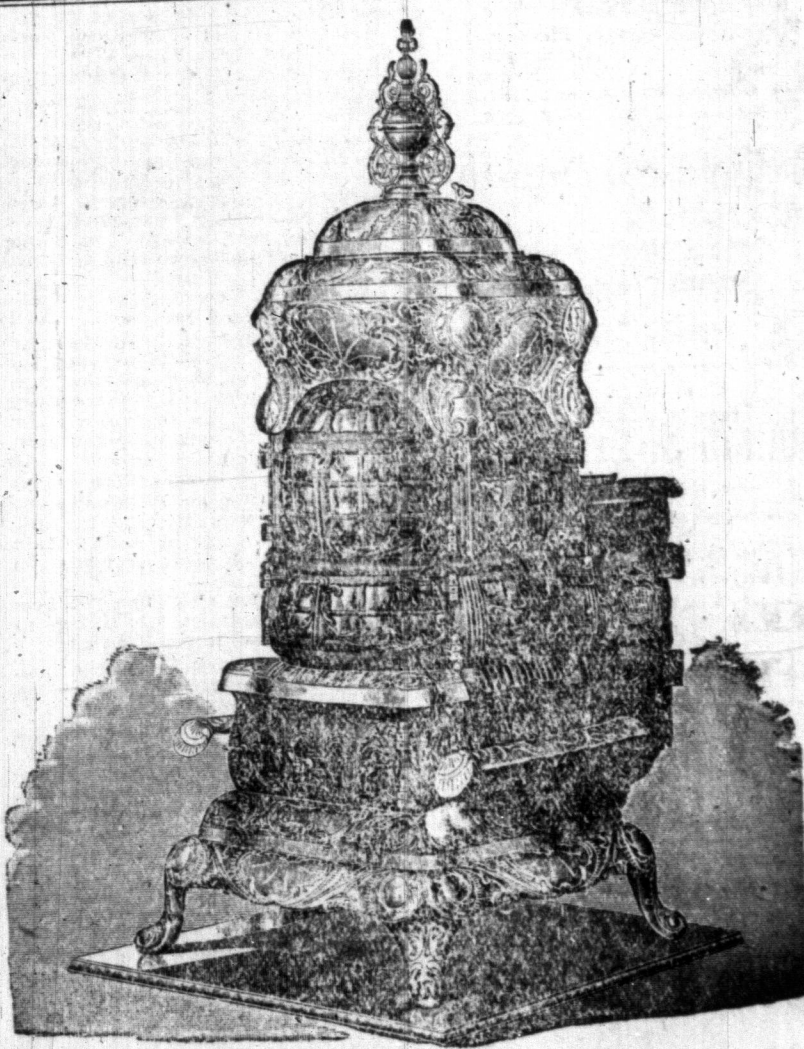
