DEER SHOT IN ESSEX.

Game Warden Quallins Has Been Investigating and the Guilty Parties Will be Punished.

Wild Gees: Plentiful at St. Clair-Large Number of Quall Killed Last Season, but Plenty are Left.

Game Warden Quallins, of Leamngton, spent Sunday in the city. Hes taking a trip through Kent county investigating some complaints against those who are shooting quail

out of season. While in the city, Mr. Quallins chatted interestedly about game and the work he has been doing lately.

Although not generally known, there is still some deer in Essex county. The game warden was notified that parties were shooting them. He went down to Marshfield and, in that vicinity he had tracked a woundthat vicinity he had tracked a wounded deer by the bloody trail a mile and a half. He, however, was unable to tell whether the deer had got awaylor not. There is strong probability that the guilty parties will be detected and punished.

The hunters at St. Clair, a little village near Belle River, have had good sport all winter shooting wild geese, which have been peculiarly plentiful.

geese, which have been peculiarly plentiful.

There have been lots of quail left over in Southern Essex, and, the temperature so far having been mild and the snow fall light, the birds are wintering well. An exceedingly large number of quail are annually shot in Essex county. Some idea of the numnumber of quail are annually shot in Essex county. Some idea of the number may be gathered from the report of the hotel keeper at St. Joaquin, a village in Southern Essex. He stated that during the season 200 sportsmen stopped at his hotel and that he had counted 1,300 quail killed by these men.

Heretofore, he has refused to be interviewed, but he has at last alked with a representative of the Associated Press, to whom he said: opportunities have been thrown away by the practice of taking a challen-ger to the other side and using her there for the purpose of sailing the number of races necessary to decide the ownership of the America's cup. These boats, of course, have been built with the object of bringing back the with the object of bringing back the cup; and that must always remain their principal work. The Shamrock II. will cross for that object and nothing will be allowed to interfere with that. When the races shall have been decided, however, I should like her to be saited in a few races against the pick of the American fleet for whatever prizes may be offered."

In view of Sir Thomas Lipton's promise to take the Erin and, possibly, the Shamrock II., to some of the principal American yachting centres, the challenger is likely to be seen on more courses than that at Sandy Hook this fall.


