A ZULU BEAU BRUMMEL.

A Type of the People England Is Trying

to Control In Africa—Not

All of Them In Revolt.

The Zulus, who are now giving the

British trouble in South Africa, are

noted as they are brave Zulu land is a

part of the South African colony of

Natal, and it is in this part of the

dark continent that the battles with

the rebellious natives have taken place.

Not all the Zulus are in insurrection,

however. Many are loyal to the British

authorities, and among these edu-

cation and civilization have progressed

to a considerable extent. Young men

of the Zulu race have graduated from

British colleges, and one, Pixley Ka

Isaka Seme, is now a student at Colum-

bia university, where he recently won

a prize for oratory. In an essay on

"The Regeneration of Africa" he de-

clared his belief that British control of

the Government was best for the pro-

gress of his race.

The wilder and more ignorant of the

Zulus are, like most savage or semi-

savage peoples, of a childlike simplicity

of character in many respects. They

themselves are fond of displaying

themselves in garb borrowed from

civilization, but they do not always wear

their attire in the fashion customary

among whites. The accompanying pic-

ture of a Zulu Beau Brummel shows

him with bare legs, but with other ar-

ticles of apparel or decoration, which

in his estimation evidently make up for

this lack of covering. For instance, he

wears a silk hat and a monocle, and

carries a cane and smokes a cigarette. He

has done his best to carry out the

white man's idea of being in style.

AIR OF LIVING ROOMS.

Coughing Caused By Decomposition of

Dust On Heated Bodies.

In heated rooms we often perceive

an unpleasant tickling odor, which irri-

tates the mucous membrane of the

larynx and causes coughing, says Bol-

lax and causes coughing. It comes from burnt

and decomposed dust, from which am-

monia and other hurtful substances

arise. This decomposition, which oc-

curs only when the dust is damp, is

most frequently found with the usual

iron stoves, whose sides easily become

red hot, in consequence of which the

particles of dust lodging on the stove

burn and vitiate the air. But the hot

air of furnaces also easily become

overheated, in consequence of which

the dust lodging on the stove and the

products of the burning mingle with the

air.

The Frele Deutsche Presse says that

Professor Esmarch of Hanover "found

in his investigations that dust, small

heated bodies not above 70 degrees C.

in temperature, the dust is always

decomposed. On ground floors, indeed,

where the air rushing in directly from

the street is mingled with the dust

from the horses' evolutions, the dust

already begins to be perceptible

when the surfaces are heated to 65 de-

grees. Notable is the observation made

by Nussbaum that dust which proceeds

from air artificially saturated with

steam evolves vapors more evil-smell-

ing and irritating than the dust from

ordinary air.

"In order to prevent the vitiation of

the air in a room, heated surfaces

must not be heated over 65 degrees to

70 degrees, and every further addition

of moisture to the air is to be avoided.

Of course the heated bodies themselves

are to be kept scrupulously clean and

are to be frequently washed off. But

this cleansing does not fully protect

from the decomposition of dust upon the

heated surfaces again. In furnace

heating the air must be carefully kept

free of dust—i. e., be filtered."
