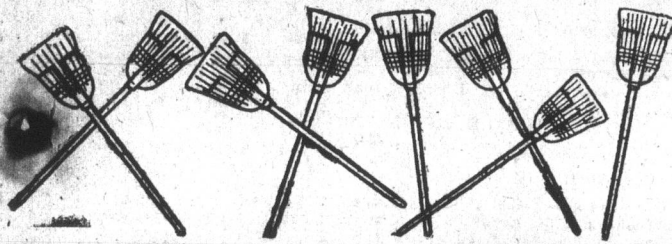

CRIMEA AND CAUCASUS

First on Verge of Revolt and in the Second Anarchy Reigns.

Extremely Alarming News Received at St. Petersburg—Just How Bad It Is Cannot Be Told Because of Rigid Censorship—Theodosia Workmen Are Backing the Kiaz Potemkine Mutineers—Life Guards Mutiny.

St. Petersburg, July 7.—Such news as came from the Black Sea and Caucasus during yesterday was extremely alarming. The whole Crimea Peninsula is on the verge of revolt and anarchy reigns in the mountains of the Caucasus from Batoum to Baku. Only brief details are available on account of the rigid censorship established by Admiral Chukhlin, commander of the Black Sea fleet. Even foreign embassies having consuls at Theodosia have not received any word.

At Theodosia the workmen are backing the mutineers. The crews of several ships in the harbor have joined the population in panic. The guns of the Kiaz Potemkine are trained on the city and a bombardment is momentarily expected.

Fanned the Flame. Telegrams from the Caucasus, where a state bordering on anarchy has existed for a month, say the news of the mutiny on board the Kiaz Potemkine made an electric impression and was the signal for a general movement with which troops and police are absolutely powerless to cope. Railroad traffic in all directions has ceased and the people are fleeing on horseback and all kinds of vehicles over the mountain roads and trails.

Kiaz Potemkine Blown Up. Odessa, July 7.—It is reported that the battleship Kiaz Potemkine has been blown up near Theodosia.

Bombarding the Town. London, July 7.—The correspondent of The Daily Mail at Odessa says it is reported there that the Kiaz Potemkine is bombarding Theodosia, the town is burning and that the soldiers of the garrison are engaged in looting. He says it is also reported that another torpedo boat has joined the mutineers.

Good Discipline. Theodosia, July 7.—A correspondent of the Associated Press, who visited the Kiaz Potemkine in company with the Mayor, found the battleship commanded by an elected committee of seven, headed by "Ensign and Quarter-master" Alexieff, a quasi-commissioned rank in the Russian navy. Everything was in order and good discipline prevailed. All the guns were loaded, and it was said that the mutineers had a full supply of ammunition. The crew consisted of 750 men and there were 15 more in the torpedo boat.

Life Guards Refused Orders. Berlin, July 7.—A correspondent at Kattowitz, Silesia, reports that he learned that sixteen men designated in each company of the Lithuanian Life Guards Regiment in Warsaw to go to Manchuria refused to make them do so. Their colonel sent to another Life Guard regiment for help, but these men also refused orders. Upon a similar refusal of a third Life Guard regiment, the colonel applied to the commander of Warsaw, who sent a detachment of Cossacks. Some of the mutineers fired on the Cossacks, who returned the fire, fourteen altogether being killed before those who resisted were arrested.

Dock Strike Ends. Cronstadt, July 7.—The dock laborers' strike here has been settled, the commercial transport companies reducing the hours of work to nine hours per day and increasing the men's wages 15 per cent.

Mikado Request to Envoys. Tokio, July 7.—The Emperor delivered an address yesterday to the peace plenipotentiaries, charging them that they should devote themselves with all power to discharge your mission and make every effort to secure the re-establishment of peace on a durable basis.

FRENCH SUBMARINE SINKS.

Ten Men Are Under Water, But Reply to Signals.

Ferryville, Tunis, July 7.—A French submarine boat with a crew of thirteen on board foundered here yesterday. The commander and two men were hurled in the air just before the submarine sank.

The divers says that the men entombed in the submarine boat at the bottom of Bizerta Bay reply to their calls.

Crew Are Saved. Paris, July 7.—A despatch received from Ferryville indicates that the crew of the submarine boat which foundered there yesterday has been saved.

A Girl to Be Pitied. London, July 7.—A Central Prison (for) for a year was handed out to Albert Smith, the young man who was found guilty of inflicting a knife wound upon young Frank Walsh because he thought that the latter had called him "blubber," a sobriquet which is said to have stuck to him for some years. As the magistrate passed sentence Smith's wife set up a great wail. She had been married but a week, and that week has been spent alone.

FIRE ESCAPES FOR FLATS

Several Improvements for Fire Protection Required in the Maple City

Council May Prohibit the Building of Hollow Walls—Successful Trip of Civic Officials

Ald. Potter and Chief Pritchard have returned from Detroit. Their object in visiting that city was to examine the fire escapes with which the theatres of that city are equipped in order to see what is necessary for the Grand.

"We examined the Temple theatre, the Detroit and the Whitney," said Mr. Potter. "The Temple has a very good system but the Detroit Opera House has a better protection against fire than our own. The same fire escape does duty for both galleries and the pit, that is they all open upon the same escape."

"At the present time the local Opera House has a three foot escape from the top gallery in addition to the ordinary exits. It is likely we will insist upon an additional and separate escape from the first gallery and then we will have an Opera House second to none with regard to fire protection."

Mr. Pritchard and Ald. Potter had a very successful trip in regard to finding information re fire escapes. They were received very kindly by Chief Randall of the Detroit fire department, and he devoted a whole hour to explaining to them different points upon which they desired information. They brought back with them plans of fire escapes suitable for flats and it is quite probable that the Council will insist on all flats in Chatham three storeys high, having these fire escapes. They interviewed the manufacturer of these fire escapes and obtained figures as to cost, etc. They also obtained a copy of the Michigan State Law which compels owners of flats to provide fire escapes. All of the buildings in Detroit in fire escapes—seven private residences that are three storeys high.

One of the chief objects of the visit was in reference to the thickness and style of walls on public buildings. Chief Pritchard, personally, is opposed to hollow walls, and not long ago he refused a permit for erecting hollow walls in the new Glassford Hotel. The committee yesterday called on Fire Marshall Baxter, of Detroit, and found him also very much opposed to hollow walls. He did not allow any to be put in Detroit buildings and it is quite likely that this principle will in future be adopted in Chatham.

Ald. Potter will bring in a report on the trip at the Council meeting next Monday night.

4,000 GUESTS

Maple City Will Entertain the P. M. Picnickers on the 22nd inst. — Special Trains.

It has been decided to hold the Pere Marquette annual picnic here on Saturday, the 22nd inst. G. W. Cook and A. Newbury, representing the railroad, are in the city today making the preliminary arrangements.

The whole Buffalo division of the road will picnic here with their wives and families—over 4,000 in all, many of them doubtless staying over till Monday.

Special trains will run from Sarnia, Walkerville, London and St. Thomas.

DOG POISONING

Some People are Resorting to Illegal Means to get Rid of the Dog Nuisance—A By-law Needed.

As is well known, there is a deep feeling in the city at present against dogs running at large. Some people claim the animals have destroyed property, and doubtless this is so. This does not, however, excuse the wanton poisoning that is going on in some sections of the city at present. J. Gilbert, the Queen St. coal merchant, had a valuable terrier poisoned a short time ago, and John Flook, who lives in the same vicinity, had one go the same way. The latest complaint is from the matron of the hospital, Miss Kennedy, who had a large hound poisoned. There are numerous other instances.

If a dog has a tag any person who maltreats it wantonly lays himself or herself open to an information. The proper course to pursue is to claim damages from the dog's owner for any injury the animal may have committed. If the dog is unlicensed, in the absence of any by-law, it is likely that any person harming it could be penalized unless actually protecting his property from the animal. A by-law is needed at once, defining the powers and privileges of both the owners of dogs and those who claim injury.

ENDS LIFE WITH A SHOT

Oliver Findlay, Son of Barrie Clergyman, Found Dead.

Revolver Lay at His Feet in His Room at the Windsor Hotel at Webbwood—Brother Was Killed in South African War—A Popular Young Man in C. P. R. Employ—His Reason For the Deed Unknown.

Webbwood, July 7.—Oliver Findlay, son of Rev. A. Findlay, D.D., of Barrie, superintendent of Presbyterian missions for Ontario, was found dead in his room in the Windsor Hotel yesterday. Death was caused by a revolver shot, the revolver being found at his feet. A coroner's inquest is being held by Coroner Flaherty of Massey.

The deceased was a popular young man, and was employed as roadmaster's assistant at the C.P.R. station here. He was an active member of the Presbyterian Church, and his untimely death caused a great shock to his many friends here.

Dr. Findlay has the sincere sympathy of the whole community in this second loss, a son having been killed in the South African war.

Body Found in the River. New Hamburg, July 7.—A young Englishman, named Briddlebank, was drowned here while bathing in the River Nith yesterday afternoon. His clothes were found lying upon the bank, and search was made, when his body was found near the bank. He came here from Liverpool about two years ago.

Mud Delays Trains. Winnipeg, July 7.—Mudslides, following heavy rains in the Rainy River district, have interfered with C. N. R. traffic during the past few days. Three men were injured yesterday in an accident on the C. P. R. Prince Albert branch.

One Drowned; Two Escape. Winnipeg, July 7.—F. Johnson was drowned in the lake at J. Carless' bathing place, Maledon, N.W.T. The two Carless boys had a narrow escape.

Thirty Passengers Hurt. St. Paul, Minn., July 7.—About thirty people were injured Wednesday night in the Great Northern westbound flyer at Springfield, 21 miles east of Willis, N.D. All of the injured men were able to resume their journey yesterday, except C. H. Stricker of Boise City, Idaho, who is reported to be in a critical condition.

Fifteen May Be Drowned. Concepcion, Chile, July 7.—A boat containing 15 persons, who left the British steamer Trope, when that vessel went ashore fifteen miles north of Concepcion recently, is missing.

Death List Is Twenty-Six. Fort Worth, Texas, July 7.—Twenty-six persons are known to have been killed and 50 injured by the tornado which swept over a portion of Montague County, in the northern part of this state, Wednesday afternoon. The property loss will probably aggregate \$200,000.
