MINISTER HERE

Hon. Nelson Monteith Arrives in Chatham and Pays Tribute to Splendid District

Hon. Nelson Monteith, Minister of Agriculture, arrived this morning on the 10:25 P. M. Marquette train. The Minister was accompanied to Chatham by T. L. Parlo, ex-M. P. P.

The reception committee at the depot included President A. J. Dolson, Directors John Houston and William Clements, H. S. Clements, M. P., A. B. McCole, M. P., Mayor Cowan, Ald. The Minister was at once escorted to the Garner, where he registered, after which, with President Dolson, Messrs. Clements and McCole and the Mayor and Ald. King and Marshall he was driven around the city.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Miss Pratt, of the Collegiate Institute Sustains Painful Injuries Through Working With Chemicals.

Miss Pratt, of Merila, a student at the Collegiate Institute, met with a very painful accident yesterday through which she had a very narrow escape from serious and permanent injury.

Miss Pratt was engaged in some experiments in the laboratory of the school when in some manner a bottle of nitric acid slipped from her hand. The cork came out of the bottle and some of the acid flew up and struck her eye, inflicting a severe burn.

Mr. Jewett, the science master, acted promptly to relieve the young lady's suffering and sent her immediately to a surgeon. It was thought at first that she might lose the sight of her eye, but under the skilful care of a Maple City eye specialist, her suffering has been greatly reduced and the sight of the eye will be saved.

The accident, while deeply regretted, has taught a lesson to the other members of the science classes that too much care cannot be exercised in the handling of chemicals. The incident itself was purely accidental, and while Miss Pratt may have been careful and cautious in the experiment, no blame can be attached to the instructors in the school.

ANTI-COALITION RIOT

Socialists in Buda-Pesth Provoke Bloodshed.

Force Postponement of Parade and Lead Attack on Independence Club—Half a Hundred Victims of Fray—Revolutionary Sentiment is Gaining Ground—General Situation Worse—Feeling in Hungary.

Buda-Pesth, Sept. 28.—Between 40 and 50 persons were injured in riots here last night when Socialists and adherents of the coalition parties, including students, clashed opposite the Royal Hotel and for two hours there were scenes of wild tremendous excitement. The Royal Hotel is the headquarters of the Independence Club, in which is the council-room of the coalition leaders.

The students and other supporters of the coalition had arranged for a gigantic torch light procession last night, but during the day Socialists issued inflammatory proclamations calling on all Socialists and others opposed to the coalition to gather and fight for their rights, which they said the coalition was trying to sidetrack under cover of an alleged affront by the King-Emperor to the whole nation. Owing to these proclamations the coalition leaders decided to postpone the torch-light procession, seeking thus to avoid bloodshed.

At 8 o'clock about 1,500 Socialists gathered outside the Independence Club and announced their intention of entering and tearing down the council-room. A large force of police was present and were assisted by 150 leading citizens. The mob made an effort to enter, but was vigorously opposed by the police.

Several Persons Stabbed. A fight ensued and amid the wildest clamor several persons were stabbed; but the Socialists were finally scattered. Fifteen minutes later, however, the Socialists again gathered. By this time many adherents of the coalition appeared and a free fight ensued. A dense mass of humanity surged in every direction, shouting and singing the Marseillaise and other songs. Knives, sticks and stones were used vigorously.

It is reported that over forty persons were wounded, eight of them seriously. Scattered aghast continued and Socialists marched to a building in which is published a coalition newspaper, where the doors had been and attempted to gain an entrance. The mob was held back by the police, while the printers and editors threw furniture from the windows on the heads of the crowd. Here, too, several persons received wounds. Finally quiet was restored.

The general situation certainly has grown worse, while the feeling through Hungary against the dynasty is increasing. It is stated that the Emperor has issued orders that in the event of disturbances such measures must be avoided if possible. Revolutionary cries are frequently heard.

G. T. R. Takes Over C. A. R. Montreal, Sept. 28.—The management of the Grand Trunk Railway announce that the Canada Atlantic Railway has been taken over by them, and that the following board of directors has been elected: Charles M. Hays, F. H. Fitzhugh, Joseph Hobson, W. H. Biggar, J. W. Loud, Frank Scott. The following names were elected officers: Charles M. Hays, president; F. H. Fitzhugh, vice-president; H. W. Walker, secretary-treasurer; H. W. Walker, general auditor.

Conference Re. Tibet. Washington, Sept. 28.—A conference will be held in the near future in Calcutta, English India, at which it is hoped that the difference between China and England in regard to the treaty of the latter country with Tibet will be adjusted. China never recognized the treaty with Tibet and protested against it as soon as the military expedition returned from Lhasa.

Y. M. C. A. For Railway Men. Barrie, Sept. 28.—Charles M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, has signified his willingness to contribute from his company the sum of \$4,500 and a free site for the erection of a Y. M. C. A. building at Allandale, to be used principally by the men working in the Grand Trunk shops there. He also proposed to give \$50 per month for the maintenance of the building.

Fight in Express Car. Decatur, Ill., Sept. 28.—John E. Ryan of Chicago, Pacific Express messenger on a Washash passenger train, and Edward Green, also of Chicago, a former express messenger, fought with pistols in Ryan's car yesterday. Both were seriously wounded and may die. Jokes led to the quarrel.

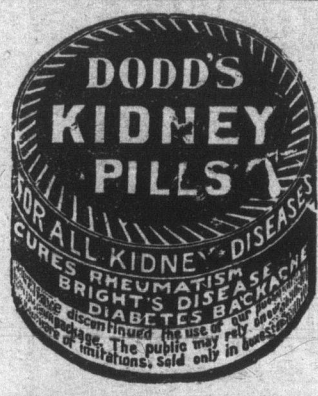

Columbia Honors Komura and Witte. New York, Sept. 28.—The honorary degree of doctor of laws was conferred by Columbia University yesterday on Baron Komura and Sergius Witte, the senior peace plenipotentiaries of Japan and Russia.

Game Commission Meet. Windsor, Sept. 28.—The Ontario Game Commission met yesterday afternoon and its labors were concluded at one sitting. Among those present was Hon. J. O. Reame, Commissioner of Public Works.

Suez Canal Closed. Suez, Sept. 28.—The canal has been closed here until further notice.



MANUFACTURERS

Part of the Report of the Proceedings of the Convention in Quebec Which Mr. and Mrs. Piggott Attended

As was previously stated in this journal, Mr. and Mrs. John Piggott, of this city, attended the Dominion Manufacturers convention in Quebec. The Toronto Globe, in the report of the proceedings of the convention, has the following to say:

"The Treasurer asked for the opinion of the members on the subject of increasing the fee of ten dollars for ordinary membership, and a discussion took place upon the matter. The present manufacturers who employ men up to the number of one hundred pay a subscription of ten dollars, and those employing a larger number twenty-five dollars."

"Mr. John Piggott, Chatham, thought that the great point was to keep up the membership, as there was strength in numbers. Labor, he said, was more thoroughly organized than manufacture. Other members considered the present subscription too low, and Mr. E. L. Drewry, Winnipeg, suggested that the subscriptions might be still further graduated."

"The question was referred to the Finance committee to report to the Executive Council."

"Mr. A. W. Thomas, Toronto, moved for the formation of a reserve fund or alternatively a contingent fund."

"Mr. John Piggott opposed this, as he could not see the necessity of such a fund, as the association was not like a concern handling a large and dangerous manufacturing plant. The motion was defeated, and the financial statement was adopted."
