Our Water Supply.

To the Editor of the ACADIAN. DEAR SIR,—As the sewerage question is shelved for a time I would like to call the attention of the Town Council to general and water consumers in particular to the sort of water that we have been compelled to use for the last few years. We are continually boasting about our superb water supply. I quite agree that we have a supply of the purest water that can be found. Let anyone examine for themselves after a heavy rain. The cause is that our town supply comes direct from drainage area, so anyone can understand that the wash from the drainage area is mixed with some of foreign matter which at present come direct to the town. We have a reservoir containing between 2 and 3 millions of gallons of the purest water in the world, but under the present arrangement it can only be used to extinguish fires. I have no doubt it would be even more effective in putting out fires as it is several degrees cooler than the surface water from the mountain. I may be altogether astray but my idea is that the supply should first enter the reservoir (the necessary piping being already laid to conduct it) where it would have a chance to deposit all foreign matter instead of settling in the main in the streets as it does at present. Thus by using our town supply direct from the reservoir we would have absolutely pure water unaffected by rains and several degrees cooler than what we are now using. I trust the authorities will give the reservoir a trial anyway. D. R. MURDO.

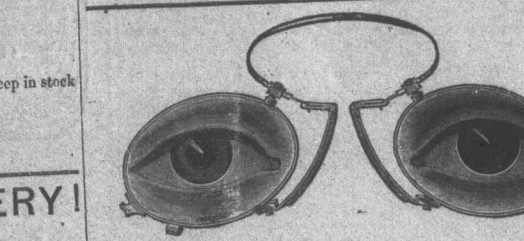
