Letters to the Editor.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.

SIR,—Mr. John Donaldson, of this place, has a remarkable defense to offer for the regrettable action of Mr. Campbell, M. P. P., in voting as he did on the selection of a speaker for the new legislature. In a letter to the Advertiser Mr. Donaldson delivers himself as follows:

"Mr. Tanner is a clever lawyer and a good conservative (by the way the conservatives are all now strong advocates of temperance and Moral Reform). He fancied he saw how he could make a little point against the Murray government, but to my mind the arguments advanced in reply quite crushed Mr. Tanner's big chest he had reared and evidently to Mr. Campbell's unprejudiced mind, he saw that it was mere party clap trap and as I fully expected he would, he voted against it."

Now the funny thing about this is that Mr. Donaldson is much more charitable to Mr. Campbell than Mr. Campbell is to himself. The latter admits that in voting for Mr. Farrell as speaker he made a mistake which he would not have done had he had more time for reflection. Every allowance can be made for Mr. Campbell as a new member, if in the excitement of an unexpected debate he should have lost his bearings for a moment. But a man, who after sitting down quietly and reading the debates describing the occurrences as Mr. Donaldson confesses to have done, and learning therefrom that Farrell, although absenting himself from the province to prevent giving evidence, he had, nevertheless, been found by the Court to have aided in distributing money corruptly to such an extent as to void Mr. Peilding's election, has not the same excuse as Mr. Campbell for coming to a wrong conclusion. If after his full investigation he regards it as a mere clap trap to object to a convicted briber becoming chief commissioner, it is evident that there is something decidedly wrong in his moral perceptions. Mr. Donaldson's case proves pretty conclusively that there is at least one 'conservative' who is not a very strong advocate of Moral Reform. Such a man is evidently not adapted either to appreciate or represent the high principles of the Moral Reform Party in this county and it would be well for this fact to be remembered when a selection is to be made to fill Mr. Campbell's place in the Municipal Council next autumn.

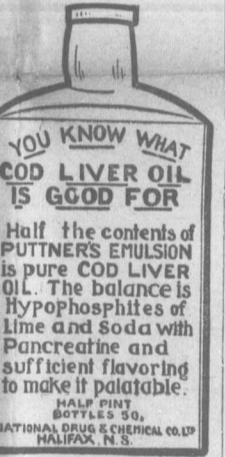

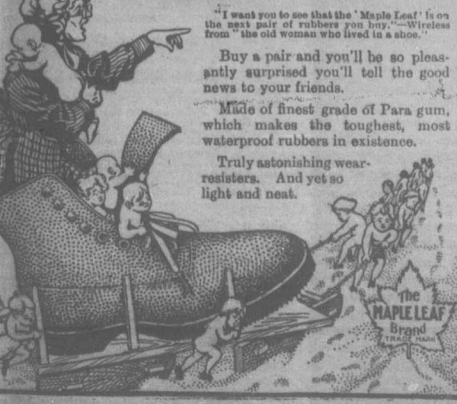
