The Band of the Royal Canadian Regiment at the Exhibition.

The Fourteenth Annual Exhibition which opens at Halifax on the 28th inst. is an event in which every person in the Province of Nova Scotia is individually interested.

The property is owned jointly by the province and city of Halifax, and is run in the interest of the farmer and manufacturer principally. The time at which it is held may be considered by many who look at the amusement and of it as too late in the season; but on the other hand it is generally conceded to be the proper time at which the exhibits of the products of the farm can be shown to advantage.

It is particularly pleasing to note that our people are beginning to take a deeper interest in the exhibition of the products of their province. This is manifested this year in the entries that have just closed. The number of exhibitors this year will be in excess of any since the Dominion in 1906.

In the Manufacturers' Building more than sixty exhibits will be displayed besides which thirty or more Halifax Manufacturers will exhibit in the annex—Halifax Made Goods.

The Work Horse Parade in which more than three hundred horses are entered takes place on the opening day. The horse races which take place every afternoon show from the entries received that this year's programme will be the best yet.

The Royal Canadian Band which made the "big hit" at the Toronto fair has been secured and will play before the grand stand every afternoon.

On the whole the prospects for a successful Fair has never been more promising in the fourteen years this Exhibition has been running.
